Some careless person lighted a match from which the gasoline took fire, and 200 persons gathered at the scene, ran for their lives. A number of them were terribly burned, and one of the section hands was burned to death.

COUNTY MONEY SCARCE.

The County Commissioners Asked to Contract no More Irregular Bills.

Yesterday C. A. Witherell served notice on the County Commissioners not to pay out money on any more bills not authorized by law, as there is not now any more money in the treasury than is sufficient to pay the salaries of the officers and the payment of such claims as the county is allowed by law to contract.

This is done under a law passed last session amendatory to "An Act to create a Board of County Commissioners. It reads as follows:

Section sixteen. The Board of County Commissioners shall not for any purpose contract debts or liabilities, except those expressly authorized by law, and whenever debts or liabilities have been created, which, added to the salaries of county officers and other estimated liabilities, fixed by the law for the remainder of the year, shall equal the money on hand in the treasury at the time applicable to the payment of such salaries and said other liabilities, then no allowance shall be made of any account, nor shall any expense be incurred other than salaries and fees and fixed liabilities, expressly authorized by law, during the remainder of said year.

SEC. 2. That section 22 of said Act be amended so as to read as follows:

Section twenty-two. Any person being a resident and taxpayer of the county may appear before and file with the Board of County Commissioners of the county wherein he resides written objections to the allowance of any claim or claims, demand or demands against the county. Such objections in writing shall properly describe the claims or demands objected to, and the Board of County Commissioners shall file the same and embody such objections in the record of their proceedings, and lay such claims or demands on the table for a definite period of time, not less than ten days, at the expiration of which time they may proceed to consider the claims or demands so objected to, together with the objections unless proceedings have been instituted in a court of competent jurisdiction to determine the validity of such claim or demands.

Fighting News.

A private letter from Soldier Walker says that a fellow in this part of the country calling himself Miller is going round saying that he tried to get a fight out of Walker, but that the Soldier was afraid of him.

The Soldier says if Miller will dig up \$250 or more, he will fight him.

Beals and Millen are both training hard for their finish fight on the night of the Dunn-Purcell contest, and a good deal of money is being wagered on the result. This fight alone will be worth going to see, as there has been considerable rivalry among the two young men, and they propose to settle as to who is the best man. The purse is not very large, but that don't make any difference to them.

Purcell is as hard as spikes, and is ready to fight to-night if necessary, and the reports from Dunn's headquarters indicate that he is just as well off.

Manager Geo. Allen says that if Purcell whips Dunn he will have him to fight the coming month in Carson. Allen thinks Dunn is going to surprise a few people and those who know Purcell, claim that he is a good man to put money on. Neither of these men can afford to lose by any crooked work, and in fact neither have ever been connected with fakes, so a red hot mill is bound to occur.

CROOKED GAMBLING.

The Faro Box that Long Brown Wanted Made.

Monday's Chronicle contains a lengthy illustrated account of the method by which sure thing gamblers at the Bay manipulate a new kind of faro box, by which any card can be taken out of the box and returned when wanted.

A few months before the suicide of Long Brown he came to this city and called on George McLaughlin of the Mint, whose skill as a machinist and inventor is well-known.

He said he represented a firm of gamblers in San Francisco who would give \$5,000 for a faro box that would enable the dealer to pull a card out of the case and put it back when wanted.

Mr. McLaughlin said mechanism would do almost anything, but that his price would be \$25,000.

Brown said it was too much, but in a few weeks returned and said his backers were ready to pay \$25,000 when the box was in their possession and proved to work successfully.

McLaughlin never did any work on the box and a few weeks afterwards, Brown, who was quite hard up and despondent, committed suicide. Brown spoke to a friend in Virginia about the crooked faro box, and said that when it was made he expected an interest in it and would never again be in want.

A few days before killing himself he met McLaughlin on the street and asked him how far along he was getting with his box and when he learned that McLaughlin had no intention of making such a box, he was very much astonished as well as disgusted and a few days later committed suicide. The box as described by the Chronicle is worked almost exactly as Long Brown proposed to have his worked.

He said the plan was not intricate, but the difficulty had been in making machinery delicate enough to work smoothly and never fail.


