

CARD FROM DR. GUINAN.

He Takes Issue With the Central Committee on the Question of Pledges.

Messrs. Davis, Robert, Copps, Chedic, Wylie and Noteware. DEAR SIR:—Your resolutions as a Central Committee have come to my notice and it seems to me that the situation calls for a reply.

I can hardly think that you gentlemen would subscribe your names to a statement, which you knew to be wide of the truth, and I will therefore accuse you of being very much mistaken.

You accuse Mr. Olcovich and me of having made pledges to the Central Committee, at the time of our appointment, that we would make no changes in the corps of teachers during our incumbency in office, as trustees. This is not your exact language, but no other inference can be drawn from your accusation. This charge is not founded on fact or anything that could be so misconstrued by the dullest comprehension.

It is a fact that Mr. Davis, and I think Mr. Wylie, were present when Mr. McGowan appointed Mr. Olcovich and me, as trustees.

We discussed the question, as to whether it would be advisable to make any changes in teachers this term, and we all agreed that it would not be wise to do so. I went further than a question of policy, which now seems to be governing the Central Committee, and stated that it would not be fair treatment to disturb any of them, at that time, as they had already begun the term.

No one could possibly understand from that conversation, that we made pledges to make no changes at some future term.

I therefore feel it incumbent on me to emphatically deny that I am a pledge-breaker; and further that I am not such an idiot as to enter upon a term of office, for two years, with the promise that I would make no changes in that time.

In the first place I would regard it as an insult for any one to ask me for such a pledge. What right would anyone have to ask it? Was I not the choice of the nominating convention? Did the convention ask such a pledge? Did I not receive a majority of the votes at the polls? Then, when it became the duty of Mr. McGowan to appoint two trustees, why should he not appoint me as one?

In doing so he only complied with a sense of propriety. You accuse us of making this a matter of politics. That is very funny. I can only compare it to the purloiner, who, finding himself hotly pursued, sets up the cry of "stop thief!"

You are the gentlemen who are turning it into politics. I cannot close this question without calling your attention, and that of the public to the consistency of Mr. McGowan.

Mr. Olcovich tells me that a few weeks ago Mr. McGowan spoke to him and said that his friend Mr. Woodburn, told him that Miss Olcovich was the brightest young lady, whom he had seen in these parts; and that Mr. McGowan finished by advising Mr. Olcovich to try and get his daughter into the school.

A couple or three weeks since, Mr. McGowan asked me what the chances were of Miss Olcovich getting into the schools. I replied that she was going in. Mr. McGowan appeared as pleased as looks and words could express.

And yet McGowan stated before your Committee Monday night, that he would not have appointed Mr. Olcovich if it had not been understood that no attempt would be made to appoint his daughter as a teacher.

"Consistency, thou art a jewel!" Furthermore, I have been told by several, that Mr. McGowan voluntarily pledged his word to Mr. Brulin that he would appoint him as one of the Trustees. If that be so, while he is unjustly accusing us of breaking pledges, he finds himself impaled on a broken pledge.

As I do not wish to encroach too much on the valuable space of the APPEAL, I will hurry to a conclusion. I will only add that it is quite possible that my knowledge of school matters will compare favorably with that of my advisers; and while I am willing to listen to respectfully given advice from any taxpayer in the county, I am not quite prepared to subordinate my judgment wholly to the judgment of the Central Committee. In the contemplated changes I feel that the interests of the school, to say the least, will not suffer.

CLEAN RECORDS.

Mint Inspector Morgan Completes His Work.

Wm. E. Morgan, Private Secretary to the Director of the U. S. Mints, assisted by A. A. Hassan, has completed his investigation of the U. S. Mint at Carson.

In an interview with an APPEAL reporter yesterday he said:

"I find all the departments in your Mint in such condition that they will compare favorably with any others in the system.

"Mr. Colburn, your coiner, has a record above the average in his work and the material produced has reached the highest standard. In all branches of the work I find the marks of skill and lasting signs of good management. The mechanical work of the Mint is perfection.

"Mr. Hofer's record as a Superintendent is clean and above reproach. He can justly be proud of it.

"The charges against the Nevada mint officials and other prominent men of your State are simply ridiculous, and furthermore of such a nature as to be impossible.

"All the accusations which from time to time have shaken this section, have gone through the most careful investigations in the Mint Department at Washington, and have been so thoroughly disproved that the Government has declined to pay further attention to the accusations, owing to the fact that all others proved to be groundless.

"The reason the Mint is being cut off from coining is because there is not enough silver produced to keep it going. The San Francisco Mint is capable of handling the bullion of this Coast until free coinage is in vogue. The assay office, however, gives employment to about 32 men, and will be run on a similar basis as the New York Government Assay Office, with the exception that this office will purchase bullion under the Sherman Act of July 14, 1890, in quantities not exceeding 10,000 ounces.

"No, I would not care to discuss free coinage, as it has no bearing upon this particular work in which I am engaged. You have many able men in the West who could give you more information on the monetary issue than myself."

Mr. Morgan dwelt at length upon the general appearance of things, and of the manner in which Coiner Colburn had provided for the laying away of his machinery. Among other things he referred to the percentage of loss in making money, which he said was nominal.

He did not seem to think the Mint would be shut down altogether, and furthermore stated that with free coinage Carson would again hear the clink of big dollars as they dropped from the press.


