NEVADA'S ENTERPRISE.

Under this head the San Francisco Chronicle says:

Until the Chronicle published its special article a few days ago it was hardly known on the Pacific slope that the State of Nevada was represented at all at the World's Columbian Exposition, and yet the fact is, as was shown by the article in question, that our neighbor has done more for itself than many larger and more pretentious States have done for themselves.

Owing to some legislative hitch or miscue there was no appropriation made for a State exhibit from Nevada, and in consequence no reservation of space in the main buildings of the exposition; but, nothing daunted by this mischance, certain enterprising and wide-awake citizens of Nevada contributed the money necessary to an exhibit, and by dint of coaxing and pleading induced certain States to divide exhibit space with them and give the battle-born State a chance. The consequence was that while Nevada had no special department she sent to the World's Fair an exhibit which was not alone remarkable, but unique, showing that the popular idea of the State—that of barren rocks and sage brush—was a fallacy.

Those citizens of the State of Nevada who came to the rescue in the hour of extremity deserve to be crowned with the laurel wreath awarded for civic valor and virtues, and Nevada should see that they receive it, even though it may be necessary to import the laurel. It devolves upon Nevada to administer the coup de grace to the old time tradition of the "Great American Desert," and we can think of no better entry for the wedge than the display of the State at the World's Fair, due though it may be not to the State in its corporate capacity, but to the energy and activity of certain of its citizens, who have faith in the future of the Silver State.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

What are we to think of a Government that forces money panics on the country it governs and lacks the backbone to protect its subjects from the financial conspiracies of other countries.


