The Cigarette Law.

Following is the act licensing the sale of cigarettes, passed at the sixteenth session of the Nevada Legislature, approved February 21, 1893, and which went into effect July 1st.

Sec. 1. From and after the first day of July A. D., eighteen hundred and ninety three, the quarterly license for the sale of cigarettes or cigarette paper shall be one hundred and fifty dollars.

Sec. 2. Any person firm or association or corporation engaged in dealing, in selling, giving away or offering to sell cigarettes or cigarette paper on or after the first day of July, eighteen hundred and ninety-three, shall take a quarterly license provided for in Section 1 of this Act.

Sec. 3. Any person firm or association or corporation, or the managing agent of any person, firm, association or corporation violating the provisions of this Act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined for each and every offense thereof in any sum not less than one hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars.

Sec. 4. The license provided for in this Act shall be collected and accounted for in the same manner as other licenses for State and county purposes are now collected.
