A Good Thing in Hogs.

The Stockton Independent contains the following, which applies with equal force to Nevada:

If anyone doubts that money can be made in hog raising in California he should consult J. D. Peters. A little more than a year ago Mr. Peters bought five hogs and put them on the Buhach plantation. They were fed on all sorts of vegetable products that would otherwise have gone to waste and on punkins, which it cost him nothing to raise. He now has 200 hogs of good size and in fine condition, and says he counts the cost of feeding them at just nothing. On an irrigated farm there is always enough of refuse to feed a goodly number of hogs, and the larger the farm the more economically they can be raised, while the benefit to land from hog culture is a source of profit that cannot well be estimated. Hereafter he will buy no more pork or bacon for his men on that plantation, but will provide them with the home raised article.
