Shall Nevada Take Action.

Chairman Nixon of the State central committee of the Silver party of Nevada issues the following: The goldbugs, with Grover Cleveland at their head, are making a most determined effort to have the Sherman law repealed at an extra session of congress and a gold standard permanently fixed upon this country. Intimidation and bribery and executed threats are their weapons. The friends of silver in nearly all of our sister States are energetically organizing for the conflict. Shall Nevada lag behind? She was foremost of all States in her loyalty to the silver cause in the late presidential campaign. It is time she was heard from in the present crisis. Let every silver club in the State and every election precinct meet in convention in their respective localities and pass resolutions in earnest protest against the repeal of the Sherman law unless a free coinage bill is substituted and forward the same to our senators and representative in congress. It has been suggested that a State convention be called, but on account of the great expense such a convention would entail upon the delegates and because it is better to have the expression of the people in each neighborhood in mass meeting, we most earnestly urge the adoption of the latter plan, and to secure unanimity of action we advise such meetings be held Saturday the 15th inst. It is of the highest importance that Nevada shall be represented at the meeting of the American bi-metallic league to be convened at Chicago the first day of August and we suggest that the silver leagues of each county, so far as possible, name a delegate to that meeting.
