WHAT KIND OF A FIGHT.

Governor Wait of Colorado in his famous speech for free coinage said that the West was ready to swim in blood up to the bridle reins in its battle for the cause of silver.

Of course this was mere oratorical hyperbole, but it set the Country thinking and woke up a good many people in the East who have not thought it worth their while to bother about the silver question. If the East should continue to debase silver and the Government should continue to rob and impoverish the people of the West and South, there will first be a political revolution and the result will be that the men who have so long been the tools of Wall street will be hurled from power and their places filled by men who will be elected because of their devotion to the principles of an honest circulating medium on a bi-metallic basis.

If Wall Street continues to run the country, the country will of necessity be broken up. The people want fair play on the money question or there will be a grand smash up. There is a good deal of talk about "conservative action," but a man who is being robbed is in no mood to be conservative.

Wall street's literary bureau has furnished the subsidized press with a list of senators alleged to be for and against unconditional repeal. It makes it stand 5 majority against silver, or 46 for and 41 against repeal. In order to obtain this result such stalwart silver advocates as Daniel of Virginia, Bate, Butler, Manderson, Mitchell (of Oregon), Turpie and Voorhees are placed among the goldbugs, and it also takes in such doubtful senators as Davis, Faulkner, Hill and Murphy. But the most absurd feature of this literary curiosity is placing Senator Isham G. Harrison of Tennessee, a rampant free coinage advocate, among the goldbugs. It's an amusing piece of humbuggery. The Reno Gazette thinks the resolutions passed at Carson's Silver Meeting were contradictory, because they insisted on the Sherman Purchase Act and denounced Sherman for demonetizing silver.
