RAILROADS AFFECTED.

The railroads in Utah, Idaho, Montana and Colorado are affected by the depression in mining. Railroad men say the general public can hardly realize the extent of the reduction in the freight business. Ore shipments have practically ceased, causing a great loss of freight, and the local passenger traffic is much less than usual. Retrenchment is the order of the day and the number of trains are being reduced on many of the roads.

As the railroads are owned by eastern men the loss of business resulting from the low price of silver is creating a sentiment in favor of the metal in an unexpected quarter. Every stockholder in western railroads feels directly interested and the managers of the roads say they are as deeply concerned in the solution of the silver question as the miners and farmers. This will tend to influence congress to a considerable extent as owners and dealers in railroad bonds and stocks in the principal eastern cities will not want to have their value depreciated.

Ex-Senator John J. Ingalls has unsheathed his tomahawk, and is out figuratively speaking, for the gore of Whitelaw Reid. Some time since he undertook to criticize the eminent New Yorker's qualifications for a Vice-Presidential candidate, and spoke of him as an aristocrat, full of supercilious insults to laboring men, and made various reflections on his dress, manner and ways. The other day Mr. Reid took occasion to retort in kind, suggesting that if he himself acted like a gentleman no such accusation could be brought against Ingalls, that the latter when last a candidate crawled in the dirt before his constituents, but was thrust into the gutter by Mr. Peffer and Mrs. Lease, and has ever since been lying there spouting mud and bad language. The ex-Senator is expected to get back at the ex-Vice Presidential candidate in a few days with a ream of foolscap and a pen dipped in gall.
