Hill has put himself in a hole as deep as the Comstock and no amount of hoisting will elevate him to the level of public confidence among western people.

The silver men showed their greatest strength in the vote for free coinage at the present ratio of 16 to 1. For this proposition were cast the voices of 161 Democrats 12 Republicans, 1 Silver and 10 Populists, or 124 in all. Against it were the votes of 114 Democrats and 112 Republicans. Total 226. The Democratic majority against free coinage was thus 13 and the Republican majority on the same side 100, while the Populists and silver were solidly in its favor.

In 1873 John Sherman assured the Senate on his word of honor that the bill regulating the currency did not demonetize gold. A few days ago Carlisle furnished figures to Voorhees to be read in the House, showing that the coinages of a certain number of silver dollars would cost the Government \$112,000,000. Now it transpires that Carlisle lied. The operation would net the Government—\$15,247,000. The gold bug campaign is a campaign of lies and nothing else.

The State Fair.

The ninth annual State Fair given by the State Agricultural Society will begin in Reno on the 18th of September and conclude on the 23rd. The directors of the society are doing all in their power to have the coming fair ahead of any that has yet been held. The speed programme is a fine one, representing over \$12,000, and will bring some of the best horses on the coast to Reno.

It is desired that all exhibits may be in place not later than September 22nd, at 12 noon. Wm. Hy. Doane, Secretary.


