To the Citizens of Ormsby County:—At a meeting of the Directors of the State Board of Agriculture, held on Saturday, October 21st, Director C. C. Powning offered the following resolution, which was adopted by a unanimous vote of the Board:

Resolved, That the State Board of Agriculture take charge of the Nevada exhibit at the California Mid-Winter Exposition, and that C. H. Stoddard and P. H. Mulcahy be appointed joint managers of the exhibit.

The Mining Suit.

The suit between Dudley and the Rayercraft boys is to determine the right to a certain placer claim in the Buckeye District.

Wyatt and Trimmer claimed to have located the claim on May 23, 1892, and the Rayercrafts claimed Wyatt and Trimmer did not locate the ground until November 10, 1892, and that, after the Rayercrafts had located the claim some months.

The testimony was very contradictory.

The case has occupied the District Court two days, and a large number of witnesses have been examined.

The evidence was all in yesterday, and General Clarke opened the argument for the Rayercrafts. He was followed by Gen. Torreyson and Attorney Summerfield for the other side, and Clarke closed the argument.

Judge Rising then charged the jury and they took the case at 9 o'clock last evening.

After being out one hour the jury rendered a verdict for the Rayercrafts. The vote was 10 to 2.

The Canadian Pacific's first-class passenger rate between Tacoma and Chicago is \$31.

George Sandback, a young and despondent farm hand, hanged himself to a windmill on a ranch near Perkins Station, Sacramento county.

Operations Resumed.

Last night's Chronicle says:

The Con. Virginia mine was opened up today and operations begun in it, after being closed down for several months. This is the inception of the work of locating and developing the body of ore claimed to exist on the 1000 level of the mine by James G. Rule.

The work started today is under the supervision of Foreman C. Harper. Mr. Harper arrived on the Comstock from San Francisco yesterday, and with a business-like expedition, got steam up and the work under way by 3 o'clock this afternoon. The force of men under him at present consists of three engineers, three firemen and twelve shaft men. When the timbers of the shaft and drifts have been rehabilitated and the task of taking out dirt begun, carmen will be added to the list.

Fatal Fire.

Hamburg, Mich., October 27.—The north-bound freight train of the Toledo, Ann Arbor & North Michigan railroad ran into a sinkhole three miles north of Hamburg Junction last night. Engineer Beaulieu, Fireman George Alberts and Brake-man Thomas Mulligan were killed. Where the accident occurred the ground had settled about ten feet. The engine, two cars of coal and one tank car of oil were completely wrecked. The wreck immediately caught fire and is still burning. Brakenman Mulligan's body was rescued from the wreck, but the remains of Engineer Beaulieu and Fireman Alberts were deeply buried and were cremated in the fire. Nothing has yet been done to recover them.


