TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS.

Elections were held in thirteen States last Tuesday. In some of those States officers from Governor down were elected; in others, only a few State officers were chosen, and in two of them, Kansas and Colorado, only county officers were elected. In New York, Ohio and Iowa, the Republicans achieved signal victories, while in Nebraska, which was also a doubtful State, the Populists were victorious. In Iowa, Governor Boies, who was elected two years ago by a plurality of about 8,000, was defeated by a plurality nearly if not fully as large as that which the State gave Harrison in the Presidential election a year ago. Two years ago Governor Boies who was an outspoken advocate of free coinage; this year he repudiated the platform upon which he was elected in 1891 and was defeated. There were great defections from the Democratic ranks, some of the dissatisfied going to the Republicans and some to the Populists. The latter gained one State—Nebraska—and largely increased their vote in every State in which a State ticket was in the field. They had hopes of carrying Virginia, but the colored vote, as a general rule, went to the old parties.

The election of McKinley in Ohio insures him the Republican nomination for President in 1896 without opposition, unless the Congressional elections next year materially change the political situation. He represents the high tariff principle, and besides is a "favorite son" of Ohio.

The Democrats now begin to see the effect of the extra session called for the purpose of completely demonetizing silver, contracting the currency and making money scarce and dear. The party was placed in full control of the National Government by the elections in 1892. It made the fight on tariff reform and won. In the extra session the issue on which it came into power it was utterly ignored, and the whole power of the Administration used to degrade one-half the metallic money of the country. The party divided very near the middle, the large wing going with the Republicans into the Wall street camp and many of the rank and file, following the example of their leaders, joined the Republicans last Tuesday.

It is of very little consequence to a large majority of the people of Nevada which wing of the Wall street combination is in the ascendancy. Both have been tried and found wanting. A majority of the leaders are against the silver interest and the hope of the masses is in the defeat of both. Next year a Congress is to be elected, and if the people are true to themselves they will see that no member of the gold trust, whether he calls himself Republican or Democrat, is given a seat in that body.—Journal.


