**IS THIS RUSSIA?**

A special from Washington declares that Cleveland never goes out without a bodyguard. The name of the individual is Samuel Brick, a man of powerful physique and determined men, with revolvers in his pocket and mounted on a fleet horse. He never allows the President out of sight when out of doors.

It is a queer state of affairs when the President of the United States, the executive head of a great free country, finds it necessary to be accompanied by a body guard in the daily walks of life.

However that does not alter the fact that such a precaution is necessary, and this fact makes it savor all the more of Russia, where the ruler is in danger of death, sleeping or waking.

The full returns of the Virginia election have not yet been made public, but the result so far shows that the People's party made immense gains by more than quadrupling their vote of a year ago, notwithstanding a large number of Republicans voted the Democratic ticket. The slums of the cities voted solid for the slum besmeared old party. The People's party, only one year old, has exceeded the most sanguine expectations and gives a guarantee that the motor of presidents will next year and in 1896 lead the victorious column of the people in the South to complete success. Such revolutions as the people have inaugurated in Virginia never go backward. Let the missionary work now be confined mainly to the cities and large towns in regenerating the unwashed and pie counter befuddled Democrats and their Republican allies, and in the congressional elections next year the people of the old dominion will have a walk over.—Silver State.

The Populists of Nebraska have good reason to feel satisfied with the result of the late election, although they failed to elect their candidate for Supreme Judge, the only State officer voted for, as the official figures show that they made a small gain in every county, but not enough to overbalance the Republican plurality of 10,000 in the contest for Governor in 1892. Last year the Populists carried forty-one counties, the Republicans forty and the Democrats nine. This year the Populists carry fifty-seven counties, the Republicans twenty-five and the Democrats eight. These figures encourage the Populists, and show that the party is in much better condition this year than last. The total vote is 17,500 less than one year ago, and the Democrats have lost the most.

The Examiner artist represents Madame Marionette "taking a seven-foot leap" over the hurdles at the race track in San Francisco, "from an instantaneous photograph." The picture shows something more than the high jump of the horse. One of the young men standing at the bars to steady the topmost one is a full head higher than the seven feet which the horse bearing the daring madame is in the act of clearing, showing that he is fully eight feet tall. The other young man is but a few inches shorter. These are probably giants come to exhibit at the Midwinter Fair, though the text says nothing of giants.—Mail.

The Government has just discovered that of the 430 Chinese brought over under the pretense of being performers in the Chinese Theater at the World's Fair over three-quarters were ordinary laborers, who selected this means of evading the exclusion act. 
