NEVADA AND THE MIDWINTER FAIR.

That the California Midwinter Fair will attract tens of thousands of visitors from the East there is no doubt. That those visitors will expect to see every Pacific Coast State and Territory represented at the Fair may also be assumed. That the exhibits which each State and Territory have at the Fair will be taken by visitors as a good average of the agricultural, mineral and manufacturing products of the State or Territory is indisputable. It therefore stands Nevada in hand to make the best display that circumstances will permit. The impression prevails in the East, even among persons whose general knowledge of the country ought to lead them to think otherwise, that the mines of Nevada are worked out, that the State is not adapted to agriculture, that it has no undeveloped resources, that it is repellent rather than attractive; in short, that it is a better State to move out of than it is to move into. Every real estate agent, colonizer, and, in fact, resident of other new States avail themselves of every opportunity to impress this idea on Eastern people, and as Nevada has never sent colonizing agents East or attempted to advertise the advantages of the State or contradict those false reports they are accepted as facts by homeseekers and investors.

The Midwinter Fair will afford opportunities to show Nevada in its true light to Eastern visitors. It produces cereals, fruits and vegetables that cannot be excelled in quality, and it has large tracts of land, yet uncultivated, on which grains and vegetables can be produced. These lands are cheaper than similarly situated lands in other States, yet they are not sought for homeseekers because of the erroneous idea prevalent regarding them. There are yet in Nevada undeveloped gold, silver, copper, nickel, antimony, lead and other mines, as well as vast deposits of various minerals such as sulphur, salt and borax. The State was awarded premiums at the World's Fair for flour, butter, honey and numerous other products. This has led many to make numerous inquiries regarding it, and if further evidence of its productiveness is furnished at the Midwinter Fair those who inquiring about our resources may come here and see for themselves.

Nevada should spend at least \$20,000 for a building and exhibits at San Francisco, and those whom its mines made millionaires should be public spirited enough to furnish a greater part of the money, and those who bought large tracts of land at bedrock prices should supply the balance. As they will not do it then the only way of obtaining funds is for the bona-fide residents of the State to advance the money with the explicit understanding that the Legislature will appropriate a sufficient amount from the public treasury to reimburse them. In this way the non-resident millionaires will be compelled to pay by taxation on the property which they own in Nevada a portion of the expense of advertising the resources of the State. At any rate we should endeavor to make a good exhibit. Let it be known abroad that Nevada has great undeveloped resources. Then when the remonetization of silver ends the financial stringency and the products of the soil command fair prices the tide of immigration will turn in this direction, sagebrush will be supplanted by wheat and alfalfa, the mountains will be pierced by shafts and tunnels, and the State will be dotted with the homes of prosperous people.—Journal.
