MILITARY ORDERS.

Ambrose Bierce, in the Examiner gives the following advice to commanders of military companies:

For a score of years it has been "my delight on a shinny night" to consider the Militiaman of the field, how they go. (They toil and spin, yet Solomon in all his glory was bodygeared with inferior state.) "On such a night," as Shakspeare will be having it, I have watched them for hours performing their warlike pranks, and even now with retrospection's backward eye

I see them on their winding way— About their ranks the moonbeams play.

The good, good Militiaman!—be it ever mine to celebrate him fitly; his gorgeousness, his patience under injustice, his submission to the meanness of the powers that be in supplying and equipping him, his stolen drills at moonrise, his noon-time parades and processions to make holiday for the fledged and be-braided show-officers who run him his Fourth-of-July annual cobbler trot with dutiful enthusiasm in patriotic pain! Our citizen soldiers are loyal, their discipline is good, their courage unimpeached. But in battle they would be valueless; they would break up and run away; they would vanish with an unthinkable nimbleness. Why?

The trouble is with the officers. Not one of them whom I have ever heard has known how to give a command. For the men to be efficient, even in drill upon the field of peace, when commanded as they are commanded is impossible. It is not that the wrong commands are given; the right ones are given wrongly; they are so spoken that deliberate precision of execution is unknown. The men are kept in a state of nervous expectancy. The preparatory command throws them into something like apprehension; the command of execution startles and disconcerts; they jump at it with unsoldierly haste; sometimes even anticipate it, never execute it with the concert that comes of coolness, tranquility, repose.

As commands are given so will they be obeyed; an officer without an untrained voice makes a soldier without efficiency. A faulty system of giving commands, or no system, will deliver an army into the hands of an intelligent enemy as surely as defective arms. In the National Guard of California the art is, I fancy, not taught. We could as profitably neglect to teach the soldier the use of his rifle.

The courage of an army is coherence; when broken up it runs away. On the drill ground our battalions hang together at least. That is because, thanks to silence and attention, the commands are heard—such as they are. But in battle there is neither silence nor attention. It is the simple truth that in all my observation of our State troops, University Cadets included, I have never once heard a command that would have been audible in the din of musketry. An officer may shout the top of his head off—he might as well shout in a vacuum. He must sing.

How Things Have Changed.

At the last election there were in Nampa 54 Democrats, 70 Republicans and 68 Populists. Now there are three Democrats, four Republicans and 200 Populists.—Nampa (Idaho) Progress.

The "national party" as proposed by General Weaver, Senator Peffer and other Populist leaders should have a platform of ten lines and broad enough for every silver Republican and every silver Democrat to stand upon. The preliminary organization should be made as soon as the next congressional elections have been held, so that the national party may be in perfect working order for the national struggle in 1896. The People's party will of course form the nucleus for the larger organization, which will undoubtedly include all labor and farmers' organizations.—Denver News.


