Harry Gorham's Child Poisoned.

The six-year-old son of Harry M. Gorham of Gold Hill, Nev., died in Dr. Woolsey's hospital in Oakland this morning in peculiar circumstances. Mr. Gorham who is a nephew of Senator John P. Jones of Nevada, and connected with the management of several of the Gold Hill mines, and his wife, were on their way to San Francisco last Tuesday night, when the little fellow was taken with a severe cold. His cries attracted the attention of a lady on the train, who sympathized with the Gorhams and gave the child a few of what she said were Humphrey's acornite pellets—a homeopathic medicine—which she had with her. Four or five pills were given altogether, but in a few hours the child was taken violently ill and steadily grew worse.

The passengers arrived at the conclusion that he was suffering with acornite poisoning, and word was telegraphed to Dr. Rickey at Port Costa yesterday morning. He came on board and administered antidotes. At Sixteenth street the boy was taken to the hospital.—Yesterday's Report.

A Baring Robbery.

Chicago, November 24. — There have been a number of daring robberies in this city recently, but none have been more daring than a robbery committed last night by robbing in the rooms of the Army Club. Sixteen members of the club were in the room at the time and there were two games of poker in operation. About \$250 lay on the tables. It was about 1 o'clock in the morning that the players were startled by the entrance of two men with masks on their faces and cocked revolvers in their hands. Keeping their weapons ready for instant use they quickly advanced towards the tables, grabbed all the money in sight, and backing to the door, made their escape before the members of the club recovered from their astonishment. By the time the members recovered their wits sufficiently to follow the robbers had disappeared.

CAVE ROCK NO MORE.

It Falls Into the Lake, Causing a Tidal Wave.

The citizens of Glenbrook were startled yesterday morning by an awful roaring which made the earth tremble. Immediately afterwards a huge wave forty or fifty feet high was seen coming from around the point to the left of Glenbrook. The wall of water came rolling down that place with great velocity, over the wharf, up into the store and warring the front of the Lakeshore House.

When the wave receded, it was found that a great deal of damage had been done to goods. In the store, the butcher shop had been lifted off its foundation, and the wharf was badly damaged. Jellerson's saloon is almost a wreck, and that part of the wharf around the store and saloon is covered with debris.

A large log was driven through the rear of the saloon, and one end now rests on the billiard table. The Meteor and Emerald moored in the breakwater near the mill, were thrown against their wharf with such force as to completely knock it out; also the boat house where Mr. Bliss keeps his private boats. The mill being so high and so well enclosed suffered little, though the lower part was flooded.

It happened that no one was out in a boat at the time, so no fatalities are reported. The row boats moored at the breakwater, to the left of Glenbrook, were thrown high and dry, and most of them damaged beyond repair.

When the water calmed down, the Meteor, which being iron, only suffered the loss of her smoke-stack and pilot house, got up steam and started out to locate the cause of the wave.

It was found that Cave Rock had toppled over into the lake. The water had been undermining it at the base for years, and it is probable that its fall is due to this action of the waves. Nothing now remains but an unsightly hole in the mountain.

The Meteor then steamed around the Lake to ascertain what further damage had been done by the gigantic billow. The wave was not going in the right direction to do much damage at Hobart, Bijou, Rowlands or Yanks, and the only damage inflicted at Tallac was the flooding of the club house and the tennis court.

At Emerald Bay only a small portion of the wave got in, and only some small pleasure boats suffered. At Bellevue the club house was floated off the wharf.

At McKinneys the dance hall was twisted from the piles and now lies close to the club house, the stairs of which were carried away and the windows broken. The stock of liquors is a total loss.

The old snag, where so many fish have been caught, is now on shore. The wave had spread out a good deal when it got around to Tahoe City, and beyond causing the Tod Goodwin to pull out a couple of piles, did no harm.

The only damage done at resorts on the other side was to small boats. By this catastrophe one of the main points of interest on the lake is lost forever.

Last Night's Fire.

A fire started in Chinatown last night a little before 8. The alarm was sounded and the hose companies and the V. & T. switch engine arrived as soon as possible. The Warriors got on first water. After an hour's battle the fire was extinguished. Several small houses, owned by a Chinaman were ruined. There was no insurance.

COAST NEWS.

A jury in the Chris Evans case has not yet been secured at Fresno.

British Columbia does not think an exhibit at the Mid-winter Fair will justify the expense.

The Federal Grand Jury at Phoenix, A. T., returned thirteen indictments for selling liquor to Indians.

Jose Maria Sortillon is under arrest at Phoenix, A. T., and charged with having buried alive his infant son.

It is stated at Nainiano, B. C., that British officials declare that a cable will be laid in the near future from Australia to the mainland of British Columbia, connecting with Honolulu.

Riverside has voted \$1,000 to be expended including immigration into Riverside county. There is contention now whether the amount should be used in improving an exhibit at the Mid-winter Fair.

Joseph Carr, a prominent San Diego county rancher, seventy-six years old, met Mrs. Julia M. Blinn, aged fifty-nine years, of Denver, in Santa Ana Tuesday night for the first time and they were married the next day.

Lang Winston of San Gabriel, one of its most prominent young men, has met with a mishap in the mountains near Camp Priddy, and may have perished in the storm of last Friday night. A search party has gone out.

President S. H. Hart and Cashier F. S. Dismore of the Buckley State Bank have disappeared from Tacoma and creditors are attaching their property. They are short over \$30,000 to their accounts with Tecoma and Seattle banks.

The east-bound Great Northern passenger train was badly wrecked near Bonner's Ferry, Idaho, Thursday. It struck a rock slide and was thrown down an embankment. Four passengers, the engineer and fireman, were wounded, not seriously.

George F. Parker has been informed against at Colfax at Wash., for the murder of A. B. Cooper at the Artesian Hotel at Pullman, October 13th last. Parker has been confined to the County Jail on suspicion since the day of the murder. He was one of the hotel guests on the night of the tragedy.

Mrs. Jeannie McHugh Brown, wife of the veteran newspaper man, Beriah Brown, died in Seattle recently, aged sixty-five years. Her husband has been connected with newspapers in San Francisco, Portland, Salem, Olympia and other coast cities during the past twenty years, and she was well known in each of those cities.


