A NEGLECTED HEROINE.

Never was there a more striking case of a country's ingratitude than the fact that Major Pauline Cushman died in want and poverty.

During the war she was the confidential agent of Abraham Lincoln, and had warm friends in Garfield and Grant.

She was a woman of tremendous grit and personal courage, and while acting as a spy during the stormiest scenes of the war carried her life in her hand night and day for years. She never knew the meaning of failure and twice when bearing information to Lincoln she had to kill a Confederate soldier in order to reach Washington in time. So great was the esteem in which Lincoln held her that when she was found sick and wounded at Chancellorville, Old Abe kept the wires hot with dispatches to the army surgeons urging them to spare nothing to save her life and a thousand bayonets guarded the cot where she lay.

Gen. Garfield was her close friend and the soldiers worshipped her. Her services to the republic can never be estimated and never be known unless the dead leaders of the war could rise from their graves.

After all her work for the Union she drops into private life and all she gathers out of the wreckage of the war was the empty title of Major and a small pension which Senator Stewart secured for her about a year ago.

So it was that she passed her declining years in poverty and neglect, the Government she had served so well refusing to even give her the slightest recompense for her work. The pension came not for her services but because she was the widow of a soldier she married after the war.

The Coroner's jury did right in ascribing her death to an overdose of medicine not taken with suicidal intent. She was too game a woman to think of suicide and at the time of her death she was endeavoring to recover a large amount of property in Grand Rapids, Michigan, to which she was heir through the death of her father.

THE RULE DRIFT.

It seems rather odd that the pointing of the Rule drift toward a supposed bonanza in Con. Virginia could cause so sudden an inflation in the stock market, as has recently occurred.

It looks very much to a man up a tree that the hanky-panky business now being indulged in was another cinch scheme to rake in the money of a confiding public.


