**Life For One Cent.**

Omaha, Neb., December 14.—In the same Federal court in Omaha in which Charles Mosher, who as President of the Capital National Bank of Lincoln was sentenced to the penitentiary for five years recently for stealing a million dollars, M. De France, a South Dakota cow-boy, will this week be sentenced to the penitentiary for one for having stolen a single copper cent.

Two months ago De France rode into Chadron, Neb., and held up the mail carrier. His crime netted him 1 cent. He was caught and pleaded guilty. The statutes provide no lesser penalty for his crime than life imprisonment.

**Parsons Found Guilty.**

After being out all night the Parsons jury returned a verdict yesterday at 12:30 p. m., of murder in the second degree, and recommended him to the mercy of the court. He will be sentenced Saturday at 3 o'clock.

Coyote Boy laugh and dance all time. Very happy. Everybody give him peanuts, candy and toys. Mr. Roberts bought all boys new suits clothes and we like him.

Tell my wife when the boys come down to Fair, for her to bring everything to make baskets and beads and tell the squaws to come to. Nice place for Indians at Fair and all be treated well. If she is not home, do not bother. Never snow here so not cold; boys feel fine.

**Garbled Reports.**

The Gazette Publishing Company on Tuesday evening gave a column resume of what it claimed to be the testimony of the plaintiff in the Freeman divorce case. At the opening of the Court yesterday morning T. V. Julien, attorney for the defendant, called the attention of the Court to the Gazette's report of the proceedings, stating that he was charitable enough to believe, and frank enough to state that in his opinion the plaintiff had made an honest effort to give a true history of his domestic troubles as he understood it, but that the report of his testimony as published in the Gazette was a libel upon the plaintiff as well as the defendant and an insult to the Court; that the plaintiff was made to say things about his wife of which he had never dreamed, much less uttered in the presence of the Court. He asked that the rule be strictly enforced; that all persons except the Court and its officers and witnesses be absolutely excluded during the remainder of the trial.

J. L. Wines, attorney for the plaintiff, endorsed what Mr. Julien said and regretted that there was no law by which such action could be punished.

The Court promptly directed the Sheriff to strictly enforce the rule during the remainder of the trial.

**COAST NEWS.**

J. D. Sherman has been sentenced to Utah to six years in the Penitentiary for the killing of G. W. Parker.

James W. Neary, who killed his wife at Santa Cruz, throwing a carving knife at her while at breakfast, has been sentenced to fourteen years in San Quentin.

George Mervin and Billy Gilbert, two miners in the Bradshaw Mountains, A. T., had a quarrel and Mervin stabbed Gilbert in the back, giving him a death wound.

Colonel George K. Shields, formerly Congressman and one of the most prominent men in Oregon history, fell over a rail into the basement of the Hotel Willamette at Salem, Or., Tuesday and broke his neck.

The floods along the north fork of the Palouse river in Washington swept everything clean. The flood is the highest in eighteen years. All the small rivers are over their banks and the neighboring valleys inundated.

Sarah Fifield, a domestic aged about fifty, died at Phoenix, A. T., Tuesday, from an overdose of morphine, supposed to have been accidentally self-administered. She was married, though separated from her husband, and has a sister, Mrs. Mary Consendain, a resident of Oakland, Cal. Deceased was long a resident in Virginia City, Nev., and San Francisco.

**Christmas in Empire.**

Jim Wiggins is going to have another turkey shoot on the 24th and 25th of December, at Empire.

Turkeys—200 yards, at 25 cents per shot, and 75 yards with pea rifle, 25 cents per shot.

Ducks—Throwing sticks, two shots for a quarter.

**International Locomotive Race.**

A New York City dispatch says: Another international race is in prospect—not one of yachts this time, but of railroad locomotives. The Challenger is Fredrick Charles Winby of England, who arrived here on the steamer New York yesterday. He is the inventor of the mammoth locomotive James Coleman, which was exhibited at the World's fair, and which he is now willing to back for a considerable amount against No. 999 of the New York Central or any other American locomotive.

Winby leaves for Chicago tomorrow, his party including an engineer and fireman. No formal challenge has been given, but an English-American locomotive race probably between Chicago and New York, is not unlikely.


