The Weather.

Foster says: The warm wave will cross the Western mountains about the 12th, the Great Central valley about the 14th, and the Eastern States about the 16th. The cool wave will cross the Western mountains about the 15th, the Great Central valleys about the 17th and the Eastern States about the 19th.  
This disturbance will reach its greatest force on the Pacific Coast and in the Western mountains about the 12th, and more than an average of rainfall and snow may be expected.

The temperature for the week will be about an average of January weather, probably not so cold as the previous week. This temperature forecast refers to the average of the whole country. The whole month of January for the United States is expected to average colder than the normal.

A Bigamist Suicide.

New York, January 6.—George Walker, a bigamist, shot and killed himself yesterday afternoon. Last winter he took to himself a second wife, without taking the trouble to legally separate from the first one. About a month ago the second wife learned of the existence of her predecessor, and began to make things warm for Walker. The pair finally separated and he disappeared.

Yesterday, very badly under the influence of liquor, he made his appearance at the home of his second wife on West Thirty-second street. He asked her to return to him and when she refused he threatened to kill her. She remained firm, however, and refused to yield. When he found that she would neither be persuaded nor frightened he drew a pistol, and placing the muzzle in his mouth, sent a bullet into his brain and dropped dead to the floor.


