Weather Bulletin.

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St. Joseph, Mo., Feb. 16.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm waves to cross the continent from the 23d to 27th, and the next will reach the Pacific Coast about the 28th, cross the western mountains about the close of March 1st, the Great Central valleys from March 2d to 4th and the Eastern States about the 5th.

The warm wave will cross the Western mountains about February 28th, the Great Central valleys about March 2nd and the Eastern States about the 4th. The cool wave will cross the western mountains about March 3d, the Great Central valleys about the 5th and the Eastern States about the 7th. This cool wave will grow more severe as it progresses eastward.

A large amount of rain is expected in most parts of the United States during the month of March, causing extensive floods in parts and farmers should prepare for a cold, wet, backward spring.

A Daring Escape.

Buffalo, Feb. 17.—Leroy Harris, alias John Hearst, accused of Post-office robbery, performed the remarkable feat of holding up a whole courtroom. Hearst asked permission to retire to the lavatory. On returning he electrified the Commissioner and all in the room by leveling a revolver and crying: "Hands up!" Up went every hand. Harris walked to the door, keeping his gun pointed toward the astonished court and passed out, locking the door and taking the key. Marshall Watts jumped to a window and fired three shots to attract attention, the others yelling lustily. The janitor was aroused, who opened the door and released the prisoners. The fugitive was out of sight.

The Carson Guard Ball.

A number of the members of the Emmet Guard and Battery A have joined forces and chartered a train to attend the grand military and civic ball to be given by the Carson Guard on the evening of the 21st. The boys believe that if the Carson Guard is patriotic enough to send a team of crack shots to the Midwinter Fair to contest in the shoots, they should be encouraged, and if the dollars of the Virginia soldier boys will help them along they may rely on plenty of them. The Wife Murderer.

The Supreme Court Friday sent down to department 11 of the Superior Court the remittitur in the case of P. J. Sullivan, the wife-murderer, convicted of murder in the first degree some months ago. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court and to-day's remittitur is the official notice of the affirmation of the verdict. Judge Seawell will probably sentence Sullivan to death to-morrow, unless some new legal technicalities should arise.—Report.

Dr. Mullen Dead.

Dr. C. J. Mullen, of Reno, died at his rooms on Second street Friday afternoon. Early in the afternoon he informed W. E. Gordon, who has roomed with him during the winter, that he felt sleepy and would lie down for awhile. Two hours later he was found dead.

Dr. Mullen was a native of Missouri, and, as near as can be ascertained at this writing, was 48 years of age. He served in the Union army and a few years ago was granted a pension. He had been a sufferer from dropsy for several years, and had tapped himself 137 times, but for some months past has been in unusually good health. His parents are living and about two years ago visited him at this place. He has a sister residing in Chicago and a brother residing in Indiana. He practiced his profession here for some years past and had several warm friends. He remarked to his companion, Mr. Gordon, on more than one occasion that he expected to die in a peaceful slumber.

His parents, who reside in St. Louis, were informed of his death last night, and the disposition of the body depends upon their instructions.

A Raid on Faro.

William Dormer's faro game at 32 Fourth street was raided late yesterday afternoon by Captain Short. The game was in progress and the police captured sixteen visitors and the entire "lay out."

Dormer was not in the rooms at the time, but a warrant is out for his arrest. Each of the visitors furnished bail in the sum of \$20 and this morning, when their cases were called in Judge Joachim's court, a continuance was granted to next Wednesday. It is understood that pleas of guilty will be entered in each case. Dormer's gambling rooms were in a lodging house and the place was so arranged that, in order to enter, it was necessary to pass through three sleeping rooms. Captain Short has made several unsuccessful attempts to raid the place, but in each instance the dealers and players had been warned.—Report.

Davis Holds the Fort.

San Francisco, Feb. 17.—The Midwinter Fair Commissioners have ordered Sam Davis, publisher of the Midwinter Appeal, to remove his type and machinery from the '49 Camp, on the ground that it interferes with a prior concession granted the Co-operative Printing Company, which holds the exclusive right to print a paper on the ground.

Davis has located a mining claim in the camp and placed shotgun guards on it, claiming the right to the ground under the mining laws of California. Miners in the camp say they can show a mineral ledge by mining into Strawberry Hill.


