CONGRESSMAN NEWLANDS ON THE SITUATION.

A letter from Congressman Newlands replying to an inquiry of the editor of the Walker Lake Bulletin regarding the Silver party is published in the Journal. Mr. Newlands reiterates the opinion expressed by him in his letter to the Washington Post. He does not see how Nevada can identify herself with either of the old parties, and in that respect agrees with our Senators. Neither does he see how Nevada can identify itself with the Populists so long as they remain wedded to impracticable theories and under weak leadership, and for these reasons exhibit only waning strength.

The Silver party of Nevada was organized for the specific purpose of advancing the cause of free coinage, says the Journal. It declared that the financial question is the paramount issue of the day, and that the remonetization of silver is of more importance to the people than the success of any political party. That was the cardinal principle of the party two years ago, and there is no evidence that the people of this State or of the whole western country have changed their minds on that subject since. The financial and industrial depression of the last year has confirmed them in the belief that they were right two years ago, and the debates in Congress on the Repeal and Seigniorage bills show that many Senators and Representatives coincide with their views. They learned by sad experience that neither of the old parties would do anything for silver. They saw their Representative in Congress, who proclaimed himself a free coinage man at home, driven by the party lash in Washington to the support of confirmed goldbugs, and they determined to rebel. They carried out their determination by severing the ties which had bound them for a generation to the Republican and Democratic parties and pledged themselves to support no man nor party that was not unequivocally in favor of the free coinage of silver at the ratio of 16 to 1.

The People's party was organized about the time of the silver movement in Nevada. It declared for free coinage and in that respect is in perfect accord with the Silver party. It incorporated several issues in its platform, some of which are endorsed by the silver men and some of which are not. Doubtless at its next national convention the impracticable issues will be eliminated, but in any event, so far as the cardinal issue of the Silver party is concerned, it is in line with the People's party, which therefore, meets with much favor among the people of Nevada. While it may have had weak leaders, strong men are daily entering its ranks, and it remains to be seen whether or not its strength is waning. It has placed a ticket in the field in Alabama and will have a ticket in the field in Oregon in a few days. It held its own in Nebraska and Colorado in the recent election and developed unprecedented strength in Virginia. Is it with the Silver party on the main issue, and for that reason deserves the good will of every voter in Nevada who places the prosperity of the State above the success of any party.

Eliminate a few of the objectionable planks incorporated in the Omaha platform and every man can endorse the rest. Its leaders indicate a disposition to make the fight on the financial question only in the next campaign and leave the "impracticable" theories for future consideration. In Nevada the Populists are faithful allies of the Silver party and in Congress they have fought gallantly for free coinage. They stood shoulder to shoulder with our Senators and Representative in their fight with the gold ring, and the only regret expressed by the silver men is that there was not more of them in the Senate and House of Representatives.

The latter is a friend of Lemon and he opened the door. As he did so a man with a slouch hat pulled over his eyes who was standing there fired a shot at Lemon and fled. The bullet struck Lemon in the arm. The victim says he recognized the would-be assassin as Graves, as he saw a portion of his face by the rays of the electric light as he turned to run after firing the shots.

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
