THE SEIGNIORAGE BILL.

If Bland's seigniorage bill becomes a law by the approval of the President, it will add about \$55,000,000 to the money volume of the country, by requiring the coinage of the bullion of which the Government robbed the miners under the Sherman law of 1890, which was passed by the Republicans to defeat free coinage, and as Senator Teller and other Republican Senators stated in the Senate at the extra session, it was passed for no other purpose. If this bill becomes a law it will be a great concession on the part of Wall street to the people, to lull them into inactivity in the coming congressional elections. If it should pass by receiving any considerable number of Republican votes in the Senate you will see the Wall street cuckoos in Nevada jumping upon the benches in their kindergarten schools to point with pride to the g. o. p. The coinage of the hundreds of millions of the other silver bullion in the treasury will not add one dollar to the currency of the country, as it is now represented by outstanding silver certificates and could only be paid out in their redemption. But the bill should pass and the coinage of the latter bullion be required, not on account of any benefit to be derived therefrom as an increase of the currency, for there would be none, but as an intimation to the crowned head of Europe and the nimble fingered and bald headed money changers of America, that as there is a God in Israel, silver shall be released from the degradation to which it has been assigned by the old parties and restored to its money functions with which it has been endowed every since civilization put off its swaddling clothes, and by our constitution up to the guerilla raid of the Republican party in 1873—Silver State.

COAST NEWS.

'Kid' Evans, a notorious horse-thief in New Mexico, has been captured.

An enterprising confidence man named A. O. Leask beat Vancouver, B. C., people out of \$30,000.

Boise City, Idaho, records five holdups in one night in a circuit of half a mile. A number of gold watches were secured.

Carl Berch, the manager of the stock company playing at San Jose, has disappeared with \$200 of the funds of the company.

The murdered babies found in Pacheco creek is still a mystery, though an effort to unravel it is being made at Pacheco.

The man who accidentally caused the beginning of the fire which swept Seattle in 1889 was convicted last week of highway robbery.

T. P. Williamson, one of Stockton's successful business men, died Wednesday at Pacific Grove. The estate of the deceased is worth about \$200,000.

The Great Northern passenger train from the East, one week overdue, owing to heavy snows in the Cascade Mountains, reached Seattle Wednesday.

The crow's nest cut-off, by which the Canadian Pacific will gain direct entrance to Spokane and other Washington cities, will be completed this year.

There were two wrecks on the Oregon Short Line Wednesday—a freight and a passenger train. Three or four employes and three tramps were killed.

At San Bernardino John Sanford shot Sam Compton, his partner in well-boring, because he alienated his wife's affections. Compton was slightly wounded owing to the excited condition and bad marksmanship of Sanford.

Floods are reported along the Oregon Shore Line in Idaho. Bridges for forty miles have been swept away. The floods were caused by the breaking of the Orchard-farm dam, twenty-eight miles east of Nampa, Idaho, and as Indian creek, on which the dam was built, flows through Nampa, much damage was done.

Nevada Should be Represented.

Des Moines, March 16.—Arrangements are being made for the Interstate Convention of silver delegates on the 21st inst. Ex-Governor St. John and Governor Lewelling of Kansas, and Governor Waite of Colorado are expected to deliver addresses. Already delegates from Montana, Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas and Missouri have secured accommodations. Many delegates are expected from the South.

Charles N. Crittenton, sometimes called the "Millionaire Evangelist" on account of his great wealth, will commence a series of meetings in Odd Fellow's Hall Tuesday evening March 20th.

He has held meetings in many parts of Europe and Asia, and during the last few years has devoted much time to the Pacific Coast, many thousands having been converted through his influence.

Preparatory services are being held in the Methodist and Presbyterian Churches. A large chorus choir will be organized for the occasion, and a cordial invitation is extended to the people of Carson, Empire, Genoa and other places to assist in these interesting services.
