REPUBLICANS AND FREE COIN-AGE.

The Party Irrevocably Opposed to Silver.

EUREKA, March 19, 1894.

EDITOR JOURNAL:—Mr. Bartine said at the "rally," "My opinion is that our hope and our only immediate hope lies with the Republican party."

Now I ask every candid Republican is there any "immediate hope" for favorable silver legislation from the Republican party? All the Republican members of the Lower House of Congress, except thirteen, are against any and all "favorable silver legislation." In nearly every Republican convention to nominate candidates for Congress next fall resolutions will be adopted unfavorable to silver. Candidates will be nominated for Congress pledged to vote against free coinage who in their speeches will deride silver from every stump during their canvass. All or practically all of the Republican newspapers will denounce free coinage and its advocates. The next Republican National Convention will adopt a plank in its platform against free coinage. McKinley or some other equally bitter foe of silver will be nominated for President, and in the event of the success of the Republican party at the next Presidential election free coinage and all other favorable silver legislation will be postponed for four years from the 4th of March, 1897, seven years from the present time. For seven years more we are to be "hewers of wood and drawers of water" for the East under a high tariff that draws ten dollars, out of our pockets when it puts one in. Seven years, the exact time Jacob served Laban for his daughter Rachel, and after seven years we would be treated infinitely worse by our task masters than Laban treated Jacob.

But seriously, my Republican friends, do you think that Mr. Bartine really believes that our only hope for favorable silver legislation is in the Republican party? Candidly, do you not think that this view was conjured up in the brain of a politician, imbued by partisan zeal born of ambitious hopes, a zeal that led him to express a hope that had no deeper seat than his lips.

Mr. Bartine devotes some space to speculation as to what the result would have been if ex-President Harrison had been elected. The position of Mr. Harrison on the silver question is well known of all men. He is opposed to free coinage unless it can be brought about by international agreement. Senator Hoar and all of that class of goldbugs profess the same views. In other words they are opposed to the independence of the United States financially but they prate patriotically about an American system when talking on tariff and the industrial independence of this country.

These men are the most dangerous enemies silver has. There is no hope of an international agreement for free coinage at a ratio of 16 to 1. Why should nations that produce no silver agree to take the silver of this and other silver producing countries at \$1 29.29 an ounce when they can buy it for seventy cents, and by simply placing the Government stamp upon it make it worth \$1.33 an ounce? It is absurd. The sooner international conferences are abandoned the better for us. The sooner we realize that ex-President Harrison, Senators Hoar, Allison and others are expressing like views are our most dangerous enemies the better for us. What we must insist upon, if we expect to accomplish anything, is independent free coinage by the United States at the ratio of 16 to 1. No more compromises, no more international humbug conferences, gotten up to delay silver legislation, and for no other purpose.

The battle is on, our cause is just, men of courage to the front, let the faint-hearted and camp followers retire to the rear. We want none in our ranks who stop to count noses before taking sides.

COAST NEWS.

P. J. Gollanith Jr. was drowned in the river at Sacramento Saturday.

At Sutter Creek Bart Howard, aged twenty-two, while drunk, killed himself.

Martin Nehr, who once kept a saloon in Roseville and a livery at Rocklin, committed suicide at Dunsmuir Wednesday last.

Miss H. Gray, Superintendent of Oak Hill Cemetery, San Jose, died Sunday. He had resided in California forty-two years.

The Arizona Wool-growers and Sheep herders' Association will reduce herders' wages to \$20 a month, and shearing to 4 cents per head.

Citizens of Baker City, Or., were much excited Saturday when they saw a green steamer over the American flag in front of the staff at the opera house. The Mayor ordered the police to take the steamer down, which was done.

By a Victoria, B. C., legislative law a stop is put to all Sunday business except conveying travelers, the operation of railways and street railways, the business of hack-drivers and livery stable keepers, the selling of drugs and medicines and other works of necessity and charity.

A report has been received at Seat, the that the Great Northern freight train which left Snohomish Saturday night was struck by a snow slide near Skokemish and swept over an embankment 150 feet in height. Six men perished with it. The train was said to have gone entirely out of sight under the slide in the valley.

After three hours' deliberation the jury in the Evans case at Jackson, Amador county, returned a verdict of murder in the first degree, and fixed the penalty at imprisonment for life. Evans on the 14th of June last shot and killed Express Messenger Michael Tovey while the latter was on the stage running between Tule and Jackson.

A carnival circuit is proposed in the South, in which the school children will take a principle part. The fiesta line will include Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, San Diego, Riverside, Pomona, San Bernardino and all southern towns. The street decorations will be beautiful.
