Robbers Captured.

Cleveland, O., March 31.—At an early hour this morning six men entered the Station of the Lake Shore road at the town of Olmstead Falls, sixteen miles from here. They overpowered the operator after a short struggle and ordered him to open the safe. He told them that he could not do so and they then bound and gagged him and prepared to blow open the safe.

When the explosion came the safe was partly wrecked, but before the thieves could finish their work an interruption came. Two farmers in the neighborhood of the station, hearing the explosion and suspecting that something was wrong, armed themselves with shotguns and went to investigate. The robbers saw them coming and took to their heels. Several shots were fired before the men disappeared.

The alarm was given and a well-armed posse promptly started in pursuit. The thieves were overtaken about six miles away from the scene of the robbery. They showed fight, but were all captured. Nine other men in Olmstead Falls has been arrested on suspicion of being concerned in the robbery.

Coxey's Labor Army.

Columbiana, O., March 31.—For the first day since the exodus from Massillon the Coxey forces were greeted with a smiling sun this morning. Camp Trenton was a jolly lodging place before the tents were taken down.

The Populist Club had secured an immense amount of supplies for the command. Oats, corn, hay, straw, a thousand loaves of bread, butter, milk, hams, etc., were ready for them when they arrived yesterday and every one had plenty to eat.

The Marshal had general orders published late last night naming to night's camp at East Palestine, Camp Gompers. Coxey as commander, was greatly pleased at the showing made by the army. It now numbers about 200 men, and the class is improving. Concerning his financial affairs, the commander stated that he had arranged with the threatening creditors to their satisfaction.

COAST NEWS.

The Heath case is making rapid progress. Nearly all the evidence is now in.

Judge M. K. Harris and Reel B. Terry testified for the defense in the Heath trial at Fresno Thursday.

Ex-convict Steve Moody of Paso Robles, who served a term for arson, is wanted for cattle-stealing and the authorities are looking for him.

Ung Sing, a Chinaman, was accidentally shot by policeman Clark Wood at Fresno Thursday night, who with others was making a raid in Chinatown.

Oregon possesses a greater number of doctors in proportion to its population than any other state in the Union, having one physician to every 440 inhabitants. Washington has one doctor to every 472 inhabitants.

The trial of Charles W. Burgess for shooting Harvey Bell and badly wounding him on the night of January 15th last at Gilroy is in progress at San Jose. Bell has long since recovered and the two men are now friends.

R. McManus, a brakeman of Livingston, Mont., shot and killed his wife Thursday afternoon and then cut his own throat. He was aged twenty-four and his wife eighteen years. No cause is known for the deed.

The feeling against the Bryans and Mrs. Fowler, who are charged at Petaluma with the murder of Mrs. Nancy Meagher, has been intensified by a brutal assault of relatives of the accused on the counsel for the prosecution, John F. Rodgers.

Five people were killed and two wounded by a landslide in the canon below Burke, Idaho, on the Cour d'Alene branch of the Northern Pacific Railway. The slide is 1000 feet long and is 50 feet on the track of the Northern Pacific at the Black Bear mine. The snow is 40 feet deep. All the miners are at work digging for the buried people.

A peculiar scene was witnessed at Spokane yesterday. John Horton, a carpenter, fell into the river and was being swept to death over the falls. He made a gallant struggle for life, cheered by 400 people, who were anxiously watching him on the shore. The current was too strong and the poor fellow was swept into the cataract and pounded to death.

This is the way the Denver News of last Monday discoursed on the veto of the Seigniorage bill:

It is a question whether the veto of the Seigniorage bill would not be a good thing. Democratic Congressmen are assuring the President that their places will be taken by Populists if the bill is not signed, and a Populist majority in the next Congress is worth a good deal more than the coinage of a mere \$55,000,000 in silver.

The children of the public school went on a fishing trip to the Carson river yesterday in John Smith's big wagon. They had a great time, but didn't catch any trout.




