**Old and Feeble Pugilists.**

Chicago, April 6.—The stories about Corbett being a sick man are being revived here, just as they were before he fought Mitchell. The New York Advertiser declares that the American champion contracted malaria in Florida and is in a bad way, and now Prerson Davies is authority for the statement that Corbett has "night sweats."

**Stricken With Paralysis.**

Felix Darah and David Tyler, who occupy lodgings in the Chapin House on South C street were both stricken with paralysis on Thursday morning. Mr. Tyler was the first victim and called to his room-mate, who came to his assistance and while Mr. Darah was engaged in endeavoring to relieve Mr. Tyler, he too, was stricken with paralysis.

Mr. Darah fell prostrate to the floor after the attack, and it was some time before aid was summoned. The attacks are light and both men are in a fair way to recover.

Mr. Darah has been employed at the office of the Gould and Curry Mining Company for several years and Mr. Tyler is janitor at the National Guard Hall. Mr. Darah is said to have suffered from a former paralytic stroke.—Enterprise.

**Will Dance in Court.**

The trial of the Cairo-street dancing girls will take place before a jury in Judge Conlan's court Friday afternoon. It is stated that the girls will give the dance, which offends the taste of Secretary Kare, in the courtroom for the benefit of the jury. **Police on Wheels.**

Los Angeles, April 6.—An order has been issued by the Chief of Police here requiring two police officers to patrol the city on bicycles. This innovation meets with much favor in police circles and more men will soon be mounted on wheels.


