Transfer of U. S. Prisoners.

The United States Attorney General at Washington has requested Judge Hawley at Carson to issue an order transferring Murphey, who was convicted of robbing the Post-office at Eagle Salt Works, to the House of Correction, at Detroit Mich., and that the order apply to all prisoners who in the future are convicted of offenses against the United States, in this district and sentenced to ever one year. It is said that this order was doubtless requested for the purpose of reducing expenses as the charges for keeping United States prisoners in the east are much less than at Carson, where one dollar per diem is charged which is said to be the highest rate in the United States.—Gazette.

"About three in the morning Helm took up his part of the bed and hied himself up on the hill back of the mansion, remarking as he departed. "I'm going up to sleep with old Sandy Bowers."

"After Helm went the entertainment began in dead earnest. Every few minutes somebody would remark.

"Well, boys, I guess we'll have to go up stairs and see Sandy again."

"After they had been up a few moments, something would come bumping down the stairs a step at a time, which on close inspection I struck me as peculiar that these bottles would come down empty after each trip of the gang up stairs. COAST NEWS.

A block of five buildings at Cahto, Mendocino county, was burned recently. The entire community turned out, and worked vigorously, saving the only store in town.

Nearly all the saloons, barber shops, cigar stores and the shops are open on Sunday, in Victoria, B. C. Eight thousand people have petitioned the Government to close them up.

Ed. Morel, the companion of Chris Evans in his last days of freedom, has been found guilty of robbing City Marshal Morgan at Fresno. The jury was out but a few minutes.

The members of the Women's Christian Temperance Union throughout British Columbia have exacted promises from all the representatives of the Province in the Dominion Parliament to do all they can to secure woman's suffrage.

Winters is aroused over the partiality shown by many ranchers in that section for Chinese and Japanese labor, and when M. C. Ferry, agent for San Francisco Chinese, went to Winters to drum up business he was rotten-egged. Washington, April 12.—It is rumored here today that a new witness has been found who could have given important testimony for Congressman Breckinridge in the Pollard suit. It was the coachman who took the couple from the Seminary. He says that after Miss Pollard had taken him into the coach he heard Breckinridge scream and call for help twice when about a mile from the Seminary. His voice seemed smothered as if a hand had been placed over his mouth. He did not interfere, but thinks had he done so in time he might have saved Breckinridge from his awful fate. The coachman is a brother-in-law of a Congressional porter, and at one time was agent for Beecher's "Life of Christ."
