THE CARNEGIE ARMOR PLATES.

The discovery that America's big battle ships are sheathed in ineffective armor turned out by Andrew Carnegie at his Pittsburgh steel works ought to set people thinking a little. Carnegie comes from the British Isles and a high Republican protective tariff invited him to come over here and start his factories. He brought some capital and a lot of foreign workmen and the increase of capital which has been enormous he invests in castles in Scotland.

It would be supposed that the making of armor plates to put on ships of American build, expected to maintain the honor of the United States on the sea would be intrusted to an American who would necessarily have a little patriotism to mingle with his business.

But Carnegie had no patriotism in the matter at all, and was probably governed mostly by the idea that it would be hardly the square thing by the flag of St. George to provide armor for American ships of sufficient strength to withstand the fire of British guns.

So it came about that the biggest ships in the American navy are cased in defective armor which can be smashed with a good-sized sledge hammer.

What a natural shame it would have been had some of these ships gone down before the fire of English guns and sacrificed some of a nation's best lives along with a nation's honor.

Americans are astounded that the work of armoring our men-of-war should be intrusted to such sources, but when one comes to consider that America allows Lombard street to dictate its financial policy, it is not surprising that England should also take a hand in building our navy.

Ever since the United States followed Washington into the field of battle to fight for liberty, it has had its foes in Camp to dispose of. England always had its agents here working for our destruction by dark and secret means. In the war of 1812 it was the same. In the big civil war England aided and abetted the South to overthrow the Union.

In 1873 it sent its agents to this country to demonetize silver. This was the greatest blow it ever dealt the United States. In 1873 it dictated how we should coin our money regulating the weight and composition of our currency and now in 1894 it dictates the strength and thickness of the armor on our battle ships. In the light of these events it is not strange that any man in his sober senses will cling to a party that tolerates such a state of affairs. Yet we find plenty of people, and seemingly intelligent people who are willing to endorse such work by steadily voting for political organizations that tolerate it.

After the Trial.

Washington, April 17.—The verdict of the jury awarding Miss Pollard \$15,000 damages in her suit against Congressman Breckinridge has affected the principals in the case somewhat differently. Miss Pollard, who bore the strain well during the trial, broke down when the verdict was announced and is now suffering from nervous prostration.

Breckinridge has only been made more defiant by the verdict. His political managers announce that he will return to Kentucky within two weeks and will open an active campaign at Paris. The Women's Christian Temperance Union here has adopted resolutions asking Congress to investigate his character and ascertain if he be morally eligible to membership in the House.

Miss Pollard is said to have received many lucrative offers from theatrical managers to go on the stage, but has declined all. Many women's societies in Washington have passed a resolution calling upon Congress to investigate the conduct of Congressman W. C. P. Breckinridge. Miss Pollard's brother declares that she will not go on the stage, although she had been overwhelmed with flattering offers since the jury rendered a verdict in her favor.

A Lost Eureka Widow Found.

The Sentinel says that a letter has been received announcing the fact that Mrs. Julia Nickals, widow of the late W. W. Nickals, who so mysteriously disappeared at the time of her husband's death, is now in Oakland, Cal. 
