NEVADA POLITICS.

From present indications the campaign in Nevada this Fall will be between the Silver party and the Republicans, aided by those Democrats who care more for party pap than they do for the principles of the party to which they belong and the welfare of the State in which they live.

The Republicans, encouraged by their victories in the East, will reform their broken lines under the leadership of Colecord and Bartine and make a desperate effort to regain the ground lost in 1892. They will point with pride, as usual, to the record of their party on the silver question. Their campaign orators will go about the State, and, with the same old arguments, attempt to make the people believe that upon the success of the Republican party depends the future prosperity of the country. They will throw truth and right to the winds, and seek by all the arts known to politicians to deceive the people once more. If successful in their schemes, Nevada will be placed firmly in the Republican column and the cause of free coinage will receive a set-back from which it will take years to recover.

While the Independent has been earnest in its advocacy of Democratic principles, and now believes in the fundamental principles of the party, the free coinage and use of both silver and gold as money, it is forced to acknowledge that the present leaders of that party are in league with the enemies of silver and opposed to the solemn pledges of their national platform. They prefer to follow Republican leadership on the financial questions to fulfilling the promises made the people that placed them in power.

These being the conditions confronting the Democratic voters in this State who believe in the free and unlimited coinage of silver and oppose the financial policy of Cleveland's administration, it behooves them to look the situation squarely in the face, and, throwing aside all prejudices, ally themselves with the party organization whose success promises the best results to the people of this State. That this party is the Silver party none but a partisan slave will deny. The Independent, therefore, will throw what little influence it possesses on the side of the Silver party in the coming campaign. With it principle is above party and the welfare of Nevada above all.—Independent.
