LOCAL MINING PARAGRAPHS.

The situation in the Consolidated Cal. and Vir. Improving.

The ore development below the 1650 level in the Consolidated California and Virginia continues to improve, according to street rumor, and the sharp advance in the price of that stock yesterday indicates that it has been confirmed.

It will require time to ascertain the extent and value of the new discovery. There is no danger of striking gas from the old burnt district in the region where the new development is located, notwithstanding the frantic efforts of the short element to create that impression.

A raise has been started in west crosscut No. 2, about 300 feet north of the Best & Belcher line from the Rule drift on the 1000 level of Consolidated California and Virginia. This raise is showing some ore.

On the 1100 level of the crosscut being advanced into West Consolidated Virginia & California ground is officially stated to have entered a more favorable formation and Superintendent Tangerman is confident that he will make a good showing when he reaches the "crest ledge," about 60 feet beyond the present base of operations.

A number of prominent San Francisco mining men will visit the Comstock next week, verifying the old saying:

"Where the carcass is, there will the eagles gather."

The Crown Point Mining Company has levied an assessment of 25 cents per share, delinquent May 28.

COAST NEWS.

The Colorado Smelter at Butte, Mont., has been burned. The loss is over \$100,000.

At Pala, San Diego county, a young half-breed Indian brained his wife with a club.

Louis Slans is under arrest at Ukiah and charged with using dynamite to kill fish in the Eel river.

The fishing schooner Storm King was driven ashore at Bartlett Bay, Alaska, and crushed by an iceberg.

Farmer George Boag of Corning, Thoma county, was thrown from his buggy and his scalp almost torn from his head Wednesday.

Miss Emma Hofford, who lives near Grass Valley, was seriously hurt by a savage bull. She was gored and stamped in a most cruel manner.

Willie Palmer, sixteen years old, a stepson of J. H. Ward of Whatcom, Wash., who left six weeks ago to go on a clamming expedition to San Juan Islands, has not since been seen.

At San Jose Wednesday Baptist Christian, a pioneer resident of San Jose, aged seventy-four years, fell from a scaffold while painting his house and broke his neck. Death was instantaneous.

The Chinese vegetable gardeners near Sacramento have had Chinese priests go up from San Francisco and pray for rain, and now they think the money expended in that direction has been well spent.

The trial of J. D. Campbell for the alleged killing of William Britain at Oroville on February 29th, during a fight in which the latter was the aggressor, resulted Wednesday in a verdict of not guilty.

Mrs. Mary Dallis, a widow sixty-five years of age, of Spokane, Wash., who had been turned out of her wayward daughter's home a few years ago, committed suicide by drowning in the Spokane river Tuesday.

The will of William Wootton, the Reedley rancher, who is thought to have been murdered by Professor Sanders, is in the Visalia Bank vaults. It was placed there in 1887, and his brother Thomas of Hereforeshire, England, is his sole heir.

There is a peculiar war on between Captain Golding of the Mogul and the Tacoma customs officials. The latter seized dutiable goods that were not on the ship's manifest. The Captain was and still is mad. He refused to fly the American flag, and takes other means of showing his displeasure. The customs officers search him every time he leaves the vessel.

An Infernal Machine.

Colubus, O., April 27.—A dastardly attempt was made this morning to kill President McBride of the United Mine Workers' Union. It was a mere accident that the plot did not succeed. This morning McBride received through the mail a neaty-done-up parcel, consisting of a box, when opened, was found to be partly filled with explosives. A match had been fastened to the cover by a string in such a way that it was expected that when the cover was raised the match would be ignited, and an explosion would occur that would kill the person opening the box.

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
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
