LOCAL MINING PARAGRAPHS.

Advance in the Stock Market— Rumors About Con. Va. The trend of the stock market continued upward in yesterday morning's Board, with but few exceptions. Mexican, Gould & Curry, Con. Va., Chollar, Jacket, Kentuck and Sierra Nevada all advanced. Ophir, which receded in the morning, in the afternoon Boards advanced 25 cents, carrying Mexican, Con. Va., and Curry with it.

Current rumors are to the effect that the body of ore on the Con. Va. 1650 will be winzad and upraised, a south drift for that purpose to be run in the direction of the ore. There are very flattering prospects current from the 1100 crosscut of the West Con. Va. It is also reported that the Curry has made a development of no mean importance in the west crosscut they are now working.

Last week was the most active week in the stock market since last November when the excitement of the Rule contract was at its height. Further reports from the Rule drift show it to be steadily progressing, with brightest prospects.—Enterprise. Death of Harry Cobb. Harry Cobb died at 9:57 a. m. yesterday, of spinal meningitis. The News of Mr. Cobb's death was received with the deepest regret as he was universally esteemed.

With the exception of a few years employed as agent of the C. & C. at Dayton, deceased has resided in Carson for about twenty years, occupying many positions of trust, the last being that of Assistant Coiner of the Carson Mint under Coiner Calhoun. Mr. Cobb was the Supreme representative of the K. of P. Lodge for the State of Nevada at the time of his death, and was a Past Grand Chancellor of the order of Knights of Pythias, and a worthy member of the A. O. U. W. Under the auspices of these orders his funeral will be conducted on Friday.

Deceased leaves to mourn his untimely death an aged and devoted mother, a wife and child, and a loving sister, Mrs. F. J. McCullough, as well as a legion of warm friends. Deceased was a native of Maine and aged 42 years. Lovelock's Latest Wonder. A single harness, valued at \$1500 is on exhibition at Lovelock, says the New Era. The harness is constructed entirely of horse hair, Frank Dias was the architect of this unique piece of work and was occupied fifteen months in its manufacture.

There are 19,490 strands in the brading of white and black hair; the mane and tail of 500 wild horses were used, amounting to 160 pounds the waste hair from the work aggregating 155 leaving only five pounds of hair in the harness. He commenced this work in California, but finding even a poor quality of hair a dollar a pound, and learning of the bands of wild horses in Nevada, he moved to Cottonwood, in the Eastern Range, and there devoted two months to lassoing the untamed steeds of the mountains, and selecting from their flowing manes and unkempt tails, the longest and strongest hairs. When the hundred pounds had been obtained he set to work on his arduous task.

Out on Bail. Jack Rudolph, who, while in a drunken frenzy, went gunning for Mike H. DeYoung and shot J. B. Elliot, business manager of the Chronicle, has been given his freedom, Police Judge Low having concluded that Rudolph is not an insane man. He fixed the prisoner's bail at \$10,000, and accepted bonds on which Christopher A. Buckley, ex-Democratic boss of San Francisco, and Maurice Schmidt, ex-President of the Board of Fire Commissioners, qualified as sureties. Rudolph is charged with assault to murder.

COAST NEWS.

John Dealy, railroad section hand, was drowned Monday while bathing in a creek Elk near Grove. A big whale, measuring over 100 feet in length, was washed ashore on the north beach at Yaquina Bay Saturday week. The John E. sailed from Port Townsend Monday with 3,690,000 feet of lumber, the largest cargo that ever left the Sound.

Joe Bondiotti, a prosperous farmer of San Luis Obispo county, committed suicide Monday by cutting his throat with a pocket knife. The four-year-old son of Albert Rodgers, who resides six miles north of Milton, Sunday afternoon fell off the porch into a barrel of water and was drowned. Professor Sanders, in prison at Fresno, is anxious to have his trial come off. He is charged with killing rancher Wootton of Reedley, and expresses fear that the determination to convict him will prompt parties to bury and then dig up a body which they will claim is that of the missing man. Charles A. Meyer, the German who a few weeks ago arrived at Victor, B. C., with a story that he had been enslaved by Indians of China Hart, lived upon the hospitality of the Indians all winter and part of the summer without working a day, and when he was finally sent off the reservation by Indian Agent Todd he concocted his story of abuse to get even on that official.

Last Saturday a ten-year-old boy named James Britton went into the orchard of A. Block, near Santa Clara, and watched the Chinese at work spraying trees. Some of the mixture used got into his eyes and some was inhaled. After he reached home he was taken sick and Sunday his body has swollen greatly and the boy was suffering intensely. A physician was called and declared it to be a case of paris green poisoning. The boy will recover. Violently Insane. Eugene Nadon, a brother of A. Nadon, came in from Theo. Winters Washoe Valley ranch last Friday very ill, and his illness has developed into a severe case of insanity; so severe that this morning it was found necessary to strap him to his bed. A. Nadon will very likely send him to the asylum as a private patient for treatment.

Boy Murdered. Fresno, Cal., May 9.—Last evening Joaquin Childers, a seventeen-year-old boy who was employed herding cattle in Watts Valley, forty miles east of this city, was murdered by someone unknown.
