PULLMAN'S LYING EXCUSE.

In their ardent advocacy for law and order not a few journals have had two words to say in defense of Pullman to one for an impartial vindication of the law. They should read what the Chicago papers have to say about King Humbert's American Marquis and his model town. While they all strenuously insisted on the maintenance of law and order they denounced Pullman as an industrial Czar, as greedy as he is despotic, and his model town as a disgrace to civilization. The Chicago Post says that the time is rapidly approaching when it will be necessary to efface the blot on American manhood that exists in the town of Pullman:

On that occasion it will be the duty of the Governor and Legislature of Illinois, the Mayor and City Council of Chicago and the Attorney-General of the State to strike the blow that has been staid too long. The so-called town of Pullman, as it stands today, is a crime against this commonwealth and an insult to humanity.

This is strong language and it is echoed by the Herald. The Legislature will be called upon to curb the despotic powers of George M. Pullman. As to Pullman's treatment of his employes here is a statement from the Chicago Advance, a religious paper disposed to be very friendly with the millionaire, that must be accepted as very conservative:

What the Pullman Company did do was to cut down wages again and again, still seeking contracts, even at losing terms, that still it might hold its industrial forces together and furnish them a possible means of livelihood, till these stressful times should be overpast. What it did not do was to lower somewhat the rental on the homes of its sharply pinched employes, or, so far as has appeared, omit its usual big dividends, or lessen the immense salaries of its chief officials, or in any other way manifest a sympathetic interest in the straitened condition of its working people and their families. The company did offer to show their book in evidence that just now it was making cars not only without profit but at a loss. When asked to refer the matter to arbitration, the answer was a sharp refusal.

Pullman has stated that he took contracts at a very low figure in order to give the people of Pullman employment, and that wages had to be reduced to save the company from loss. This is a deliberate falsehood masquerading under the guise of a half truth. The contracts were taken so that the laborers employed would rent Pullman's houses trade at Pullman's stores and burn Pullman's gas and drink Pullman's water on all of which a profit was realized. Pullman did not care because he made no money on the contracts—he was making his profit off his employes. Having built a town with water and gas works as a private investment, his shops must be kept going to keep the houses filled. He took contracts lower than anybody else merely to get rents and profits. Directly he made no money on his contracts but indirectly he did. All the time he was taking contracts at such low figures (and striking at wages all over the country) and reducing the wages of his employes the stock of the Pullman Company was paying its regular dividends. Pullman is a liar as well as a brute.

THE DEATH OF M. D. FOLEY.

The tragic end of Colonel Foley, whose funeral takes place in Reno today, carries with it a very grave lesson.

The bullet which tore through his vitals on Thursday last avenged the ruin of many a young girl, who had been the victim of the dead man's lust.

He had been for years what might be termed a professional libertine, and in addition to this he possessed the unfortunate characteristic of taking such a pride in his successful amours as to cause him to talk of them, and it is a wonder that he did not fall anytime during the last twenty years by the hand of some husband or father.

In his pursuit of the weaker sex he was persistent and deliberate, with no governing sentiment other than animal passion, and in the end he paid the terrible but inevitable penalty of his folly.

The curtain of his life went down on a wretched ending, a betrayed woman and a dishonored wife. To the later the entire sympathy and respect of every man and woman in Nevada goes today.

COAST NEWS.

Saloon-keepers are being arrested at Fresno for selling liquor without a license.

The Riverside Banking Company was in charge of the Sheriff Thursday on an execution issued for \$6,000.

Six whaling vessels from San Francisco are said to be locked in the ice near Herschel Island, in the Arctic Ocean.

Sim Reynolds, a teamster, was terribly scalded by falling into a vat of boiling water at the slaughter-house at Los Gatos Thursday.

A trainload of negro coal miners is expected at Roslyn, Wash., to take the places of white strikers. Trouble is anticipated when they arrive.

M. B. Williams, one of the deputy assessors of Santa Clara county, was defaulted for the amount of \$1,000. Williams has posed as a pupil in elections.

Glid Holbeck and a man named Gibbs were drowned in the main North Fork of Clearwater river. The men left Spokane last May for a prospecting trip.

The six companies of the Sixth Regiment, National Guards, left Bakersfield for their homes Thursday morning. Captain Byrnes, with a detail of fifty men, remained on the railroad reservation.

The comet medal of the Astronomical Society of the Pacific has been awarded to Professor J. M. Schaeberle of the Lick Observatory for his discovery of an unexpected comet on the negatives of the eclipse of April 16, 1893.

Professor Aldrich, entomologist of the Agricultural Experiment Station at Moscow, Idaho, has investigated the grain aphid, which is found all through that section. Professor Aldrich believes that the aphid will do no serious damage to crops.

"The influence of the A. P. A. is driving Catholics out of office in Tacoma," says the rector of St. Leo's Catholic Church in that city, "and if it is continued it will ruin the city. Four Catholics were let out Tuesday, presumably because they were Catholics."

The Black Diamond Cannery buildings were destroyed by fire Thursday. A Chinaman started a fire in the gasoline pots.
