## ALL SORTS.

The Nebraska Republicans are split wide open.

The Nye county silver men will support Tom Bell for Governor.

The State department has issued warrants for the San Salvador refugees.

George Lamy went to Woodfords yesterday to play for a dance given at that place.

No appropriation has been made for putting in operation the income tax provision of the tariff bill.

The hoisting works of the Bodie Standard mine recently destroyed by fire was insured for \$27,000 and will be rebuilt at once.

The APPEAL acknowledges the receipt of a ticket to the Lawn Tennis Tournament at San Rafael, commencing Friday, Sept. 7th.

At the Republican primaries in Yerington on the 14th there were but 27 votes polled. At the silver primaries at the same place on the 15th there were 90 votes polled.—Dayton Times.

### Milk and Butter.

Yesterday the writer overheard a rancher in a grocery store making the assertion that Holstein cattle did not give much milk and were very poor butter makers.

It seems a pity that there is so much ignorance in the country regarding a proposition so easily demonstrated. These cattle have headed the list of milk, butter and cheese producers in the last few years and swept the field in all public contests.

Some years ago John Sweeney and the Editor of the APPEAL offered to meet any cattle breeders in the State in a public contest with other cattle for any part of \$1000 a side, and the offer, although open for over a month, was never taken.

Mr. John Sweeney's thoroughbred Holstein produced 120 pounds of butter in 30 days and the test was authenticated by half a dozen persons.

Nevada Queen, owned by the writer, last winter gave 34 quarts a day for several weeks and never gave less than 30 quarts a day all winter.

If these two records have ever been beaten in the State we would like to hear of them. a23:f

### Bryfogle Knocked Out.

The application of Harry Somers to be granted the guardianship of Ivan Treadwell, a minor heir of the Treadwell estate came before Judge Rising yesterday. James Torreyson appeared for Somers and Gen. Clarke for Dr. Bryfogle. It was held by Clarke that young Treadwell was not a resident or inhabitant of the State having been here but 21 days and brought here under an assumed name. Calvin Somers and Dr. Bryfogle were both in Court. The Somers faction claim that Bryfogle is a professional guardian and not entitled to the guardianship, as the resignation of Calvin Somers was not before the Court when Bryfogle was appointed. The Court held that Bryfogle was not the legal guardian and refused the application of Harry Somers on the ground that the limited sojourn of Ivan Treadwell in Nevada did not constitute a sufficient residence. The boy Treadwell has a one-fourth interest in an estate worth a million and will on reaching 21 receive \$300,000 in cash. His sister who was 18 not long ago received \$80,000 without sacrificing any of the realty.

Mr. Hewett's feet were still in the stirrups when the horse got up, but the supposition is that his neck was broken by the fall, as he fell off shortly after the horse got on his legs. ## COAST NEWS.

Mrs. Winifred Neagle committed suicide at Truckee Monday. Domestic unhappiness was the cause.

Charles Crow, the slayer of a Phoenix A. T., burglar, whom he shot while trying to enter a store Saturday night, was exonerated by a jury Monday.

The log raft cradles form a prime attraction at Astoria, Or. Sight-seers contribute \$200 sometimes in a day to the street-car line which goes out to the scene of operations.

The men employed at the North Star and Empire mines at Grass Valley were notified last Monday that their wages would be cut. The men receiving \$3 a day will be cut to \$2 50, the \$2 50 men to \$2 25 and the \$2 25 men to \$2.

On the 15th of April Manua Garcia sowed seven and a half acres of barley on his place near the Cienega school house, San Luis Obispo county, and it was thrashed the other day and yielded 464 sacks, weighing 110 pounds per sack.

A freight train, on the Seattle, Lake Shore and Eastern Railroad, consisting of ten cars loaded with coal, logs and shingles, was wrecked near Latona, Wash., Monday, by striking a cow, and two of the crew were killed and terribly mutilated.

W. J. Cornell of El Cajon, San Diego county, who advertised to take care of children so that they would give no trouble to those who wished to dispose of them, has been taken to Los Angeles to answer the charge of attempting to defraud through the mails.

Nimona Handt, an Idaho prospector, accidentally shot himself through the hip last Wednesday while cutting a trail forty miles from Salmon City, and was nearly dead when found. It took several miners three days to bring him out of the hills, and he endured severe suffering.

The cases of E. Seyler and others, charged with stealing a train at Dunsuir to bring armed strikers to Sacramento, were dismissed in the Police Court at Sacramento on motion of the District Attorney, and they were fined \$5 each on another complaint for evading the payment of railroad fares.

Work on the extension of the Southern Pacific is still moving south, and the prediction is made that before many months the people of Elwood will have the construction camps in their midst. The contracts have all been let and the graders will be at work in dead earnest in short order. There is no doubt that Santa Maria will be reached by next February.
