## BIG IRRIGATION SCHEME.

An Eastern Syndicate to Reclaim Nevada Lands.

It is rumored that an Eastern syndicate is making arrangements to come to this State with a large colony of settlers and put a big irrigation project in operation.

These people were first induced to examine into Nevada's resources by her exhibit at the World's Fair at Chicago, and when they learned that the State had taken first premium on each article exhibited they became very much interested, and realizing what splendid chemical properties the soil of Nevada contained, began a colonizing scheme which is now nearly completed.

Mr. Howard Wright who was in Chicago at the time, did much to further the project and assist them in their investigations.

The parties who have the matter in hand are men of large capital and propose to put several thousand acres under cultivation and place thrifty families on them. It will take a good deal of capital to do this and in a few weeks their agent will be in Nevada looking over the ground. If he could be induced to visit Carson Valley and see the quantities of water running to waste there and the good storage sites coupled with the remarkable soil, he might be induced to select that locality as the scene of operations.

### Lively Runaway.

Yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock two members of the demimonde were driving out in a single buggy when the horse became unmanageable on Kings street and started on the run. The buggy dashed into the curbing of the Capitol square near the west gate and the occupants were thrown out. Maud Johnson fell onto her face and the buggy on top of her. Clara Reed struck on her head which was badly cut and bruised, she was able to get up and walk into Dauchy's Drug store. The other was so badly injured that she had to be carried into Dr. Lees office. It was at first supposed that one of the girls was killed, but inside of an hour they were both recovered enough to walk home. The buggy was smashed and the horse went tearing through the streets with the shafts and the two front wheels. The horse has not yet been recovered.

### Reorganized.

The Journal says that President Stubbs has reorganized the University into three distinct branches or heads, viz: A department of business, one of instruction and one of discipline.

### Death of Mrs. Chubbuck.

Mrs. Geo. R. Chubbuck died on Thursday evening at 10 o'clock. The immediate cause of her death was blood poisoning. Deceased was only 24 years of age, and her sad and untimely death is a severe shock to all who know her. Mrs. Chubbuck was born in Dayton, January 14, 1870. She was a devoted wife and mother and leaves a large circle of warm friends. The funeral services will take place at the late home of the deceased at the Cohn ranch near Genoa today. The interment will take place in this city.

### Strikers Indicted.

Yesterday the U. S. Grand Jury found true bills of indictment against S. C. Marsh, Thos. Cleary, Patrick Martin, Samuel Howard and James Cummings, on the charge of obstructing the U. S. mails, and a bench warrant for their arrest was ordered. Bail in each instance was fixed at \$2,500. The marshal was ordered to have them all in Court next Thursday at 10 a. m.

## HARD TIMES.

Money Never So Scarce in Carson.

Every year about this time Carson goes through a period of great money scarcity. The Summer trade is always dull and the fact that about half our population goes to the Lake, makes the collecting of bills no easy task.

Dollars became as scarce as hens teeth and this state of affairs usually continues until the chilly weather sets in.

This year the financial stringency has been more marked than usual. Nearly everybody took in the Mid-winter Fair and there was a steady drain of coin to San Francisco all winter. It seems as if nearly everybody had stopped paying their bills and also stopped collecting them.

It might be a good idea to have a town meeting and establish a sort of Clearing House so that the various accounts in the community could be adjusted. By giving and taking orders all round the ring it would seem that a good deal of indebtedness could be wiped out.

### COAST NEWS.

J. W. Dunlap, one time a butcher at Paso Robles, out of work, disheartened and deserted by his wife, attempted suicide Wednesday at Paso Robles.

Richard Donahue, the convict who fatally stabbed A. Jackson, a fellow convict, at San Quentin several days ago, has been arrested on the charge of murder.

The new wage schedule prepared for the Oregon Railroad and Navigation Company engineers and firemen has not been accepted by the committee of fifteen representing the men.

Counsel for ex-Policeman Craig at Los Angeles who killed his wife and her parents a few weeks ago, have given up the case. The enormity of the offense was too great to defend.

Adolphus Stein, who died at the County Hospital at Riverside from, it was supposed, a poisonous fly bite on the lip, is now said to have died from anthrax, communicated by the fly.

The Grass Valley miners held a meeting last evening and passed resolutions requiring Assembly candidates to pledge support to a bill to abolish compulsory trading at the stores of mining companies.

An army of crickets, that has been marching north from the Malheur country, arrived at Blue Mountain Springs, at the head of the John Day Valley, Or., last week. Crops were too far advanced to receive much injury.


