READY TO FOLLOW JONES.

Dubois of Idaho thus unbooms himself to a Washington correspondent:

Senator Jones is not to be criticised for his action. His motives were honest. Nor can it be said his step lacked wisdom. I know what his feelings are. Nor do we agree in some matters. If we did I should be with him today in his departure from the Republican party. Senator Jones has lost all hope of the emanation of any good to silver from the Republicans. I have not. If I had I would go with Senator Jones. The only difference between us is that he has lost confidence sooner than I. For myself I shall go to my state and do my utmost for Republican success in this campaign. We have a senator to elect and my energies will be turned to electing a legislature which will send to the senate a free silver Republican. But the Republican party generally should take notice by the action of Senator Jones. It means much to the northwest and foreshadows the coming action of myself, Teller, Wolcott, the whole host and herd of northwestern Republicans, unless there is a change. I am willing to say now—and those who take an interest may guide themselves by it—that I will join Senator Jones between now and 1896 unless the Republican party declares for free silver—as absolutely free as gold. I mean free coinage of both silver and gold at a ratio of 16 to 1. There need be no doubt as to my statement. If the Republicans do not declare for the free coinage of both silver and gold at a ratio of 16 to 1 I shall join Jones and Stewart with the Populists. And I know at least six senators who have similar intentions. And it will cost the Republicans four more states. It has lost them Nevada already. It will cost them a quartet of commonwealths besides. And if they can stand it, why, we'll have to. Do I believe the Republicans will declare in their national platform of 1896 for free coinage, 16 to 1? I do, and say it with emphasis. It is my firm belief that they will. On that belief I fight in the campaign now fairly won. If I am wrong, if no such silver declaration is made by the party, I shall leave it. The effect of Senator Jones' action is hard to measure in advance. He is one of the strong figures in our party. In my own state, as, indeed, in all about him, including California, there is no man whose example would have a more profound effect. The Populist party of the entire West is stronger today by 25 per cent than the day before Senator Jones made this change.

"Looking at it from the standpoint of politics," said Colonel Morrison, "the Republicans made fools of themselves when they helped Cleveland repeal the silver purchasing clause. And it's too late now for them to help it. Jones going to the third party will hurt 'em deeper than they'll like to admit. Teller, Wolcott and Dubois and the rest of the silver Republicans won't be far behind Jones. They understand each other. They're not jumping in the dark nor jumping alone. They expect to control, not the balance of power in the next congress for silver, but their plans reach further than that. They intend to hold the balance of power for silver in the next electoral college and pick out a president who is their way."

REPUBLICAN ADVISORS.

For some time past the Republicans of Ormsby County have taken great interest in the party machinery of the silver men.

They have endeavored in various ways to suggest just how the Silver party should be managed, and while silver men feel flattered in the interest taken in them by their opponents there is a general feeling among silver men that outside assistance is not needed in running the Silver party.

During the past week the APPEAL has received several letters suggesting the Crawford plan of primary and some were from men who threatened to bolt the party and smash it all to pieces if the Crawford plan was not adopted.

The Central Committee at first favored the Crawford plan until it discovered that Republicans were pulling every conceivable influence in line to have that plan adopted.

The letters referred to were in every instance anonymous and this caused a well founded suspicion that they were not genuine.

Any silver man in good standing who at anytime wishes to make suggestions to the Silver Central Committee will always be well received and the committee will grant him a respectful hearing. Anonymous letters written to the APPEAL will be regarded as coming from Republican sources until their authors come to the front and declare themselves.

Some of these letters charged the Central Committee with a failure to consult with the Silver party.

All its meetings were open until it discovered that the Republicans were sending spies to them and after that the room was cleared of everybody. The committee favored the Crawford plan until it had sufficient proof that the Republican bosses were preparing to take a hand in the primaries by sending Republican voters into them and use money to nominate the weakest possible ticket.

When these facts were known the candidates, the Committee and silver men of all factions united in declining to give the enemy the opportunity it was seeking and the delegates were selected by the candidates and the Committee.

It will be a convention of representative silver men and they will place a ticket in the field that will contain the elements of strength, harmony and success.
