Accused of Setting Forest Fires

Chicago, Sept. 26.—W. J. Littlejohn of Chicago, in delivering the annual address before the Fire Underwriters' Association of the Northwest today, declared that the recent forest fires were started by the lumber kings. They had taken that method, he said, of covering up their stealings and to them was directly due the death and destruction which followed. The speech caused a sensation. The occasion of today's gathering was the celebration of the silver anniversary of the association.

Talked too Much.

It now transpires that the Tribune beat Buckingham. The editor had a proxy in the caucus and his vote beat Hawthorne. It would have been left that way but the Tribune people blomed so much about what they had done and tried to make the delegates think that the Tribune was running the convention. They talked the matter over and concluded that if such an idea got abroad it would hurt the ticket and so they sat down on Edward just to notify him to keep his place.

The Mormons O. K.

Washington, Sept. 27.—The President has issued a proclamation granting amnesty to all Mormons suffering deprivations of any rights under conviction of polygamy, bigamy, adultery, etc., committed under the color of polygamous marriage. The President says he believes the Mormons are now obeying the law, and that the promise of the Mormon church to no longer sanction such crimes was made in good faith. The proclamation follows up the conditional amnesty granted by President Harrison.

A Silver Man Nominated.

Omaha, Sep. 27.—The Bryan free silver faction had charge of the machinery of the convention when it reconvened at 8 o'clock. The credentials committee reported all contests in favor of Bryan, leaving the Administration anti-silver element in a small minority in the convention, there being scarcely 100 delegates. Congressman Bryan was chosen by acclamation for United States Senator, and replied in a speech pledging himself to work for free silver and against monopolies.

Eureka Still Solid.

Mr. Hartnett, foreman of the Diamond mine at Eureka, was in this city yesterday. He says that the county is practically solid for the Silver ticket.

The report published in the Tribune, that Mr. Reed, President of the company, was working for the Republican ticket in Eureka is false. Mr. Reed is a resident of Utah and is taking no hand in Nevada politics.

The John Smith Club.

The Ogden Press says the Republicans of Salt Lake City have organized a precinct club and christened it the John P. Jones club. While this was being done the wires from the East were conveying the news of Senator Jones' withdrawal from the Republican party to become a Silverite. The name of the club will probably be changed to the John Smith club.

COAST NEWS

Hawaiian Minister Thurston is at Portland.

Hense's private bank at Centralia Wash. has suspended.

A large number of prairie schooners are passing through Missoula, Mont., bound for the Nez Perce Reservation.

Miss Jeanette Gale, aged seventy years, formerly a teacher of music, was burned to death at Napa Tuesday. Miss Gale was well known in San Francisco.

Don Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo made his triumphal entry into San Diego Tuesday. He was welcomed with cannon and fireworks. The city is filled with visitors to witness the celebration.

The Los Angeles Herald is now published by the Herald Publishing Company. The capital stock is \$100,000 in 1,000 shares. The management is changed, and it will be a straight-laced Democratic organ.

Yuma has been rather unfortunate with its big capitalistic schemes. Two of them, the Colorado River Irrigation Company and the Chicago Syndicate that was to develop the the Picacho mines, are pronounced frauds.

A sensational report is published at Missoula that a portion of the body of Colgate, the cook of the Carlin party who went hunting in the Clearwater country, and who was left there to die by his comrades, he being too ill to be carried out of the place, has been found. The other portions having been eaten by wild beasts.
