With our contemporaries, every man's nose seems to be measured by dollars and cents. It is a poor way of measuring people, but our neighbors seem to know of no other way.

Our journalistic neighbors have asserted that the Appeal turned down the Board of County Commissioners two years ago, because it was not given the printing contract.

Now to clear a lot of rubbish not necessary to the argument, let us admit this to be true.

The Appeal called for a new deal in county affairs and made such a showing that the taxpayers rose up and endorsed the Appeal's demand, in very unmistakable terms at the polls.

The result benefited the Appeal just \$50 a month and it saved the county of Ormsby nearly \$1,000 a month.

Now if there is any taxpayer who doubts this assertion he can be very readily convinced by calling at the office of the County Recorder and going over the official records where he will very readily be convinced.

The question now arises is \$50 a month too much for the taxpayers of Ormsby to pay to a paper that has saved them nearly \$1,000 a month for nearly two years. We have yet to hear of any one outside the offices of our esteemed contemporaries making any fuss about it.

If they feel however that the \$50 a month drawn by the Appeal for county printing and advertising is an imposition on them individually, they have but to call at this office and get their pro rata of the amount refunded. The same offer is made to any other taxpayer in Ormsby.

After the votes are counted, the News will be compelled to acknowledge that the Appeal's fight has been for the whole ticket.


