THE RACES.

The next was a mile dash between Vanity, Alcatraz, Albatross and Eureka. The last named is one of El Rio Reys gets and great things were expected of him but Vanity took the race, after all hands had made a game struggle for the lead. Time 1:47 1/2. Eureka second and Albatross third.

The four and a half furlongs was between Silver State, Kit Carson, Banjo, and Renwick. The race was hot from the jump. The talent picked Kit Carson for a winner but Bill Thompsons horse Silver State landed first money.

The trotting race between Esmeralda, Alpha, and Daisy K. Alpha, took the first heat, Daisy K. distanced. Esmeralda took the next three heats and the race. Best time 2:30 1/2. It was reported that Henry Bath had purchased the mare Esmeralda just after the race.

THE STATE LAND OFFICE.

Reasons Why it Should Not be Abolished.

Constitutional Amendment No. 31, abolishes the State Land Office and imposes the duties of that officer on the State Controller. Should this amendment prevail, no benefit will inure to the taxpayers for the following reasons:

Sections 17 and 21 of the State Land Law provide that all salaries and expenses of the Land Office shall be paid out of moneys arising from the sale of lands. Hence the Surveyor General's Office does not cost the taxpayers a dollar, and our public schools are maintained chiefly from the proceeds of this office. Why kill or cripple the "goose that lays the golden egg?"

For the year 1891 the interest payments on land contracts alone were \$43,750.32, and in 1892 \$60,343.36; and these payments will continue to increase until the 180,000 acres of land remaining unselected shall have been disposed of—not to anticipate future grants.

The net receipts of this office for 1892 were \$97,831.53, which goes to show the magnitude of the work done, and the importance of this office. (The above figures are taken from the latest biennial sworn statement of the State Land Register.)

It is also important to know that if no more applications for land be made during the next four years, there would be constant employment for several clerks and a draughtsman to carry on the work already begun, involving the preparation of plats and abstracts for County Assessors use (which is also the source of much revenue to the several counties) and the collection of interest payments on some 7,000 contracts now in existence, which number will be increased upon the approval to the State of the 180,000 acres of land not yet under contract.

The question naturally arises, can the people expect better service by crippling a useful public servant, and by imposing upon one officer the conflicting duties of two?

Under the present system the Controller is a check between the State Land Register and the State Treasurer, and should remain so for the security of the people.

Should the proposed amendment be made, the Controller, as ex-officio Land Register, would audit his own accounts. Do the taxpayers desire this?

Admitting that the work of the combined offices could be done by extra clerks, there are certain executive duties of the Controller at various times during the year which would prevent his personal supervision of important correspondence in the Land Office, or work in the field as Surveyor General and State Engineer.

Is it good policy to require of one man the performance of the duties of two or more, in different places at the same time?

Again, the proposed constitution would make it absolutely necessary to enact a new land law (and every voter knows that it takes time and money to make laws.) For example; section 5 of the Land Law says that the Land Register shall "indorse upon each application the exact time of its receipt in his office and shall certify to the State Controller, (to himself) etc.

Section 12 provides that "all moneys hereafter paid into the Treasury on lands shall be paid in on an order from the Controller, and all moneys refunded to applicants shall be drawn out upon a warrant issued by the Controller. Whenever by reason of non-approval of lands to the State, or other cause, the contemplated sale cannot be completed, the Land Register shall certify to the Controller that such applicant is entitled to the amount paid, and the Controller shall file such certificate in his office as a voucher drawing his warrant upon the proper fund for said amount, and the Treasurer shall pay the same. The Land Register shall, at the same time, certify in like manner the Treasurer."

Similar references to the Controller as a middle man between the Register and Treasurer, occur repeatedly in the Land Law.

It certainly behooves every voter having at heart the interests of Nevada, to consider well the consequences of the proposed consolidation, before voting to destroy the efficiency of two such important offices as Controller and Surveyor General.

The voters should bear in mind that while experimental legislation is dangerous, experimenting with the State Constitution is still more dangerous.

Vicious laws can be repealed within two years. Not so with the Constitution.

The taxpayer who votes "yes" on amendment 31, takes every chance to loose and nothing to gain.

Consider well before you vote.
