Dark as this picture is, there is considerable truth in it, but the time may come when by the grace of God and better times financial affairs may do better.

The worthy Baptist pastor however, may have been in error when he gauged the religious tendency of our people, by their failure to support the Church.

When times are hard and money tight, it is natural for people to scrimp and they generally begin to economize on churches and newspapers. Men always feel that there are times when they can get along without pews in a church or space in a newspaper. Of course they take risks on their future state and also on their worldly prosperity, but you can't teach 'em any different.

The True Inwardness.

The Enterprise, in its report of a political meeting held in Dayton last week, represented that Lyon county was something hot bed of Republicanism. Now comes the Lyon County Times and gives the real history of the meeting, as follows:

The truth about the above named meeting is that it was held in a saloon. There were only six persons present, some being from this place and some from there, and the balance from Silver City.
