Carson Silver Men Open Their Campaign.

FIRE WORKS, SALUTES MUSIC AND A BIG CR. W.D.

CARSON GREET'S THE STATE CANDIDATES.

A Splendid Meeting at the Opera House.

Last night was Silver's jubilee in Carson. It was the opening gun of the campaign, and shows the Republicans that the old spirit that scored a victory for silver in the enemy's stronghold in 1892, was still rampant in Ormsby.

As the train arrived from Virginia City bearing the speakers, candidates, Comstock silver men and Glee Club, it was met by a delegation of Carson Silver men, headed by a band. As the train drew up it was greeted with the cheers of the crowd, the boom of anvils, the flash of fireworks and the music of the band.

The greeting the candidates got at the depot very soon disbursed their minds of that idea.

The crowd headed by the band then marched to the Opera House, which was decorated for the occasion, and packed with people.

AT THE OPERA HOUSE.

The Editor of the APPEAL called the meeting to order and after a few remarks congratulating the audience on the growth of the party in Ormsby from the day it was hoisted and decided in the same Opera House to the present occasion, when it was greeted with an audience that the party or cause might be proud of.

Dr. Fox was then introduced as permanent chairman, and made a short speech which was roundly applauded. Walter Chedic was elected Secretary, and the following were named as Vice Presidents of the meeting: Wm. Berger, Andy Lindsay, F. Cumpawa, D. Circe, Sam Lougabaugh, R. Crow, P. H. Peterson, Jake Webber, G. R. Bradley, M. Cohn, Warren Noteware, J. P. Sweeney, John Meyers, Sam Davis, Andy Todd, Jerry Barrett, Walter Cook, Geo. Kitzmeyer, Geo. Gates, and Fred Knoblock.

Mr. Newlands, the principal speaker of the evening received an ovation from the audience. He spoke in his best vein. The audience was large and responsive, and none of the good points or good logic of the speech were lost. He began by speaking of the peaceful revolution going on all over the United States. The present party leaders were scoffing at the size of the party that were calling for a radical change in the monetary laws. He thought that a party that polled over a million votes, after an organization of six months was a party of some promise. All great movements had small beginnings.

The Christian religion had its origin in a little manger in the town of Bethlehem. The time has passed when neither of the old parties could be believed on the coinage question. They had for over twenty years been humbugging the people on the question. People submitted to be humbugged for a long time because they failed to see exactly where the duplicity of the party leaders opposed them. But of late it had been shown that the terrible depreciation of all values had been caused by the withdrawal of silver as a money metal.

They had begun to realize that it was time to cast off their allegiance to the old parties, who with Janus faces showed a gold luster to the East and a silver glow to the West. They discovered that the monetary policy of the Government was for the rich and not for the poor, and that times were getting harder and harder. They knew the cause and were repeatedly being taught the remedy. The remedy was to form an independent party, and when it grew large enough to hold the balance of power the problem of forcing the Government to coin that silver was solved.

The Republicans were repeatedly losing their hold upon the West,

and the Democrats were not so solid in the South as they used to be. As soon as the Silver party had the balance of power the old parties would be breaking their necks to get into the silver wagon. Would it not be well for the Republicans of the West to adjourn, leave politics alone for two years and withhold their votes from their party. This would teach the Republicans that the people out here were in earnest.

If this State failed to go for Silver it would set the cause back twenty years. It would be considered a case of weakening in the East where they are watching every movement. The eyes of the United States are on the Nevada election. The Republicans of the East wish to return to power and they can only do it with our votes and they can't get our votes until they give us the kind of silver legislation we want on the money question.

The speaker called on the Republicans to look at the prosperity of Nevada before the ambitions of their party, and stand by silver in November. The speech was heartily applauded throughout and cheered at the close.

The Comstock Glee Club was a great feature of the meeting. Their rich and beautifully modulated voices in the campaign songs were enthusiastically enjoyed. They were called on again and again.

John E. Jones, the next Governor, followed Mr. Newlands, and the reception he got was simply a corker. He gave a short history of his tour through the eastern part of the State and of the condition of the towns which had almost been wiped out by silver demoralization. Silver, wheat and cattle without a market, and men once prosperous who could scarcely pay their taxes. He painted the desolation of that section in eloquent language and was attentively listened to.

Robert M. Beatty kept the audience in particularly good humor by his sallies for nearly an hour.

Major Huffaker made a live talk to the voters.

C. E. Mack clearly explained the situation in regard to the proposed Constitutional Amendments.

Many of the other candidates addressed the meeting and all received an ovation from the audience. Lack of space prevents a full report of the speaking.

Cutting, LeGrave and Howell made five minute addresses and were loudly cheered. Senator Westfield declined to speak on account of the lateness of the hour. He will address the people here before the campaign closes.

The wind was so high that it was deemed unwise to burn bonfires, and the announcement to the audience that the wood would be delivered to the poor people in this city was received with a burst of applause.

The meeting adjourned with three hearty cheers for the ticket.

The meeting was one of the largest and most enthusiastic ever held in this city.
