A BUGLE CALL.

Senator Stewart Addresses His Nevada Constituents,

And Calls On Silver Men to Rally at the Polls.

NEWLANDS SHOULD BE RE-ELECTED.

THE SHAM TARIFF BATTLE OF THE OLD PARTIES.

Bartine True to His Party, But False to His State.

UNITED STATES SENATE, WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 21, 1894.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE APPEAL: I very much regret that my business affairs prevent me in taking part in the pending campaign in Nevada. I cannot, however, entertain a doubt of the success of the Silver party. The cooperation of the Silver party of Nevada with the People's Party in 1892 and the common cause for which both came into existence, leave no room for a separate organization of the People's Party.

THE GOLD PARTY THE COMMON ENEMY.

The common enemy with which the people are contending is the gold party with two names, one Republican and the other Democratic. The Silver party of Nevada maintained in 1892 that the paramount object of both the old parties was the contraction of the money to the single gold standard. The evidence was then sufficient to satisfy reasonable men that both the old parties were under the control of the gold combination. Events have proved that the Silver party was right. When Gladstone and Cleveland decided to suspend silver coinage in India and to stop the purchase of silver bullion in the United States, the Republican party said "Amen." When President Cleveland convened the extra session to approve and ratify the crime of 1873, which demonetized silver, the Republicans in both houses of Congress, with three or four honorable exceptions, outside the silver States, rushed to the front and aided the President to destroy silver as a money metal. It took all the power of the gold press, the money kings and the vast patronage of the Administration to convert Silver Democrats to the gold standard, but the great mass of Republicans volunteered their services to accomplish the wicked work. The Cleveland Democracy and Republicans in Congress worked and acted as one party without subterfuge or disguise. Faltering and hesitation in the Democratic ranks delayed action, but the determined and aggressive policy of the Republicans sustained the President and achieved a victory for gold monopoly and defeated the representatives of the people's most sacred rights.

THE ROTHSCHILDS COMBINATION

Includes the National banks and the great banking institutions of Europe. Unfortunately many of the Senators and members of the House of Representatives were partners with the gold trust by holding stock in the national banks, which are a part of the combination. The enemy entrenched in the two houses of Congress, backed by the Executive and the gold press, waged an unrelenting war against the people. Since the adjournment of the extra session some Republicans of influence and standing have again attempted to deceive the people. They argued that the Republican party was the only party which could or would adopt free coinage.

A PLATFORM OF DECEPTION.

The Republican clubs of the United States met at Denver to form a platform of deception, but failed to decide. They declared in favor of the interconvertibility and parity of the two metals, which they had always done, meaning thereby that all money should be on a parity with gold by redemption in gold coin, which is the gold standard, for if silver must be redeemed in gold it is no better than paper, and forms no part of the basis of circulation and credit.

The canvass has progressed until a few days of the election. No Cleveland Democrat or Republican of any kind north of the Potomac and east of the Dakotas, except Senator Cameron, has declared for free coinage. They have either been silent or openly denounce any further use of

silver as money. Harrison, Reed, McKinley, Hill, Russell of Massachusetts, Wilson of West Virginia, and all the great lights of Republicanism and Cleveland Democracy, have declared that the tariff is the only issue, while Sherman, the acknowledged financial leader of the Republican party, for more than a quarter of a century, denounced in his opening speech at Akron, Ohio, free coinage as "a declaration of the demagogues of the hour." How can any honest, intelligent man expect to get free coinage by supporting a party led and controlled by either Cleveland or Sherman? The people have submitted to the leadership of such men for many years, until the gold standard is adopted. There are fewer signs of a change of policy now than ever before. So-called Silver men in either of the old parties are more injurious to the cause of free coinage than the avowed advocate of the gold standard. The people are too much inclined to follow their leaders and they naturally feel that if their trusted leaders can be silver men and adhere to the Cleveland Democracy or John Sherman Republicanism they may also aid the cause of silver by building up one or the other of the old gold parties.

SENATOR JONES.

My honored colleague, Senator Jones, hesitated long before he would give up all hope of reforming the Republican party to which he has so long been attached, but when the time came the evidence was overwhelming that the Republican party was par excellence a gold party, he severed his connection with the party that had abandoned the people and had become the tool of their oppressors. He valued principle above party and acted the part of an honest man. He could not represent the people of the State of Nevada and the Rothschild combination at the same time.

CONGRESSMAN NEWLANDS.

Mr. Newlands, whom the Silver party honored by an election to Congress, has observed all the pledges he made to the people. He has stood by the paramount interest of his constituents. To defeat him and elect a man who, if he were true to his party must be false to the people, would do more to injure the cause of free coinage than anything else the people of Nevada can do. Mr. Bartine is a Republican. If elected he must be true to his party affiliations and false to the people of Nevada. It is impossible to train in the ranks of gold monopoly and advance the cause of free coinage. There is no more propriety in a friend of free coinage serving in the ranks of the Republican party or the Cleveland Democracy than there would have been for a Union man to have served in the Confederate army or a secessionist in the Union army.

FIGHTING A SHAM BATTLE.

The fact that Republicans and Cleveland Democrats are fighting a sham battle over the tariff was never so apparent in the present canvass. When the tariff bill was about to pass the gold party became alarmed for fear of losing the tariff issue. Cleveland came to their rescue, denounced the bill and declared that the war for tariff reform must proceed and that the bill passed by the Senate was not the tariff reform to which the Democratic party was pledged. He was compelled to tell the reason why and in his letters to Wilson and Catchings he gave that reason. Free coal and iron, for which New England was clamoring, were not in the bill, although the tariff on those articles had been reduced from 70 to 40 cents a ton. He declared that the agitation must continue until this oppressive duty was removed. The absurdity of keeping up tariff agitation for free coal and iron after everything else had been arranged to his satisfaction can be appreciated when it is known that the entire duty on these two articles at 70 cents a ton is less than a million dollars, and that not one voter out of a hundred ever knew whether or not there was a duty on either coal or iron.

The Republican orators immediately took up the gauge of battle thrown down by the Executive and are now canvassing the country against the wicked machinations of Mr. Cleveland who wants free coal and iron. Neither the Republican party nor the Cleveland Democracy care two cents whether the forty cents duty on coal and iron is repealed or not, but they prize the issue above all others because it enables them to continue the cuttle-fish game of darkening the waters by tariff discussion to prevent an examination of their schemes of plunder through

gold standard contraction.

TIMES GROWING WORSE. Times have been growing worse ever since silver was demonetized. The people have suffered more and more under each successive administration. This gives each party an opportunity to attribute to the other all the calamities which have come upon the country. Each party promises better times and breaks its promises because contraction continues to make times worse. The only claim to the votes of the people that either party can have is that the other is worse. In short, each party exists on the infamy of the other.

I hope the people of Nevada will stand firm for the cause of free coinage by giving an overwhelming majority to the Silver party. Such a result would be invaluable to the cause of free coinage, while a contrary result would cheer the hearts of every member of the gold combination in Europe and America.
