Profits in Saloons.

One bar in New York, not very far from the postoffice, is said to be worth a monthly profit of \$6,000, and others up town turn in annual profits ranging from \$75,000 to \$100,000. It is a general impression that there is an immense amount of profit in the business, but I doubt very much, if that impression was ever so strong as it must be now after the sworn statement of Counselor Fromme as to the profits of a well-known firm now in court difficulties in this city. It appears that the firm in question paid during a year \$53,842 for liquors, of which they had at the time of testimony \$3,000 worth on hand. The \$50,000 worth sold brought in cash \$116,182, a profit of \$63,340 on the investment. On a sale of cigars of \$50,000 worth there was a net profit of \$7,418. In other words, the profit of the liquor was 115 per cent, and on cigars 50 per cent. I imagine that "impression" as to profit will stand.—New York Recorder.

Woodburn Takes a Trick.

The case of the estate of S. C. Wright vs the Carson Water Co., was before the District Court again yesterday. In the original suit for \$2,000 the water company put in a claim for \$672 for water.

Yesterday Woodburn made the point that the claim being against S. C. Wright in life time was now a claim against the estate and should have been filed as the law provided in such cases. The attorneys for the Water Company, Sumner and Torreyson, having neglected to file the claim within the time prescribed by law it had no standing in court. The Court agreed with Mr. Woodburn and the claim was dismissed.
