STEAM VS. MULES.

THE GEIGER GRADE FREIGHT LINE INJURING CARSON.

Business men in this city admit the APPEAL's assertion that merchandise can be purchased cheaper in Virginia City than Carson.

The reason ascribed is that the freight trains over the Geiger Grade from Reno land freight on the Comstock cheaper than it can be landed here by rail over the V. & T. There is no reason why the V. & T. should not be able to meet this mule-team competition and place Carson on a commercial level with Virginia City.

Ormsby county was one of the counties that subscribed bonds to build the road and the taxpayers of the county have been digging down in their pockets to pay these bonds ever since the road was built.

But since the freighting began over the Geiger Grade the rate has been advanced to \$1 60 per hundred pounds, and in some cases merchants claim that they have been charged even a higher rate.

The difference in prices have been so marked that people in this city go to the Comstock to purchase goods. It is a peculiar state of affairs, but nevertheless true and now the mule-team idea has become so popular that there is talk of putting on a line between Sacramento and this city by the Placerville route.

If the same rates are charged, however, as there were during the strike the Placerville route will not compete with the R. R.

The Geiger Grade line, however, has been running over a year and doing a paying business, landing freight on the Comstock cheaper than the V. & T. does.
