A Queer Arrest.

One night about two weeks ago a couple of Italian woodchoppers named Joe Eregliani and Bob Vienna waylaid John Rossolini down by the school house and "beat the everlasting head off him." When Rossolini was able to get around, he made a complaint before Justice Hill and a warrant was given to Constable Long with orders to go out in the forest near Lake Tahoe and arrest the men. Long held the warrant some days waiting for a little sunshine and clear sky, and then took a bodyguard consisting of Bob McLennan, Julius Grali and "Junks" All went on showshoes, and a heavy storm came on before the posse had got five miles from town. Bewildered, blinded by snow, utterly exhausted by the journey, Long and his deputies arrived at the woodchopper's camp in a wofully delapidated condition. They started out expecting the Italians would fight to the death before being arrested. By the time they got to camp they were near dead themselves completely at the mercy of the woodchoppers. The Italians cared for them, fed them up and finally brought the Constable and his posse into Truckee. They then went before Justice Hill and plead guilty to battery upon Rossolini. They were sentenced this morning to pay a fine of \$25 each or serve 25 days in the county jail. They paid the fine.—Truckee Republican.

COAST NEWS.

Arizona's gold production has been nearly double during the past year.

Navigation on the Fraiser river above Westminster, B. C., is closed by the ice.

Robert J. Broughton, Santa Barbara's Sheriff, dropped dead Monday morning shortly after breakfast. He was elected to serve his ninth term last November and was a Republican in politics.

There were forty victims by the Silver Lake, Or., Christmas festival horror, and fully as many more were injured. The dead were nearly all burned beyond identification and were buried in one grave.

And now New Mexico has two Legislatures. The Republicans seceded and organized an extra House. The Democrats selected officers and put the House in working order on a Democratic basis.

At a fireman's ball at Wallace, Idaho, Mrs. John Rrenaham left her eleven-months-old baby girl asleep in the carriage in the dressing-room. During her absence some woman whose name is not given, sat on the child and killed it.

Kelly, the leader of the "Industrialists" at Sacramento, was talked to by the Chief of Police, and he concluded to leave that town accompanied by a number of fellows. The rough element at the Capital is creating alarm among the citizens. Robbers are frequent, as are also hold ups and knock downs.

The restaurant-keepers say that at every election and public event of any kind, when the restaurants would naturally do a big business, the church steps in and cuts off their revenue by opening a competing eating-house in some public hall and gets most of the trade.
