Resolved, That our visit to Virginia City will be long and pleasantly remembered for the opportunity it afforded us of visiting the famous Comstock mines, and reveling in the delights of sleighing; and to those who contributed to our pleasure in these matters, we extend our sincere thanks.

Resolved, That we appreciate the kindness of the Southern Pacific Company in arranging our itinerary so as to afford us an opportunity of seeing the scenes of the Sierras under the most favorable circumstances; and that our thanks are due the Virginia and Truckee Railroad for courtesies extended us on our pleasant trip from Reno to Virginia City and that our further thanks are due the Pullman Car Company for the liberal and efficient service rendered us on the entire excursion.

A LITTLE GAME BLOCKED.

Attorney-General Beatty created some consternation at the State Capitol by enquiring into the methods of the late officials in letting contracts to supply public institutions. There was only one bid to supply the State officers with stationery. This led General Beatty to enquire if calls for bids had been advertised. He was informed by ex-Secretary Grey that it was not the custom to advertise for bids. General Beatty stated that the State officers were neither legislative nor judicial bodies. They could not amend the laws nor decide how they should be construed; their duty was to obey them.

Such plain, straightforward language as that surprised the old officials and the merchant who was informed, without advertising the fact, that bids would be received for certain supplies. They were still more astonished when the Purchasing Board, by direction of the Attorney-General, decided to give all dealers a chance to compete for supplying the Capitol, by notifying them that bids would be received for a stated period, thus blocking the little game by which favorites were given advantages that the law contemplated should be accorded to all.—Journal.
