The Ladies all Right.

Some people urge that it will not be policy to give the women of Nevada the ballot, for fear that they might vote the Republican ticket as they did in Colorado. A question of justice ought never to be one of policy. But the causes are not parallel.

Local issues cut quite a figure in Colorado and the Silver men put up a weak ticket as is often the case where a new party is the victim of too much success.

A lady correspondent of the Reno Journal says among other things:

If the women of Nevada were permitted to vote they would not do as the women of Colorado did at the last election, and cast their votes for the gold Republicans for all know that through their legislation silver was demonetized and that it has clogged the wheels of all the industries of the United States, and for the last twenty years we have been pleading with that party to restore silver to its place beside gold at the ratio of 16 to 1. You will find the women of Nevada true to our industries. I have heard a great number express their surprise that every man did not vote the silver ticket. They ought to have thrown aside all party prejudice and show a solid front for remonetization of silver.

How is This.

In 1892 Dr. Southworth of this city borrowed \$1,000 of the Pacific States Savings, Loan and Building Company of San Francisco, at 6 per cent. He has payed his interest monthly since that time amounting to \$152 and also \$444 of the principle. Recently wishing to be released from the mortgage he supposed he still owed \$556, but was unable to secure a release from the mortgage until he paid the sum of \$882.

He settled on these terms and paid the amount in order to secure the release of the mortgage, in order to sell his property. The Company seem to have bested him \$331 and also raked in \$152 interest.
