

ANTI-PULLMAN LEGISLATION.

The attitude of the Pullman Company in the strikes last summer, has resulted in a large crop of anti-Pullman legislation in various parts of the country.

The following are some samples of the legislative war now being waged against the most obnoxious monopoly in the United States:

Harrisburg, Pa.—Two bills effecting the Pullman company are before the Legislature. One provides that fare for a berth shall be \$1 for the first 100 miles, 50 cents for each additional 100 miles, and no upper berth shall be let down if not occupied.

Little Rock, Ark.—Newton introduced a bill in the House several days ago reducing the rate on sleeping-cars to half a cent a mile. It also provides that the upper berth shall remain closed when not occupied.

St. Paul, Minn.—Each branch of the Legislature has before it a bill to amend the law so as to tax the gross earnings of sleeping, palace and dining car companies, as those of railroad companies are taxed.

Albany, N. Y.—Two bills affecting sleeping-cars have been introduced in the State Assembly and are now in committee, where it is thought they will slumber until the close of the session.

Olympia, Wash.—A Senate bill fixes the sleeping-car rate at \$2 for twenty-four hours, \$1 50 for twelve hours with berth, and \$1 for twelve hours, 50 cents for six hours without the berth, duration of passage to be determined by the time schedule instead of actual time consumed.

Nevada has been robbed for years by the Pullman people, and this Legislature should see that a law is placed on the statute books, regulating Pullman cars in the State, and also taxing them.

UNIVERSITY DORMITORIES.

The bill providing for extra dormitories for the State University at Reno passed the House Tuesday. It provides that the money shall be appropriated from the school fund and in its place thirty-eight bonds of \$1,000 each shall be deposited.

The Elko Independent, whose editor has been County Superintendent of Schools and a practical teacher in the public schools for years, calls attention to the fact that on the 1st of January, 1895, \$74,655 89 lying idle in the school fund and that this money can be put to no better use than the building and furnishing of the necessary buildings for the use and benefit of the boys and girls of the State.

The Assembly yesterday beat the resolution providing for a committee from the House, to assist in arranging the Inaugural Ball. The members who voted against it say that \$5 is too high for tickets, and the Senate must come down a peg and place the tickets at \$2 50.

Washington, Feb. 12.—The Finance Committee voted to report the ninth section of Senator Jones (Ark.) Financial bill as an independent measure. It provides for the unrestricted but not free coinage of silver, giving the Government the seigniorage.

Several printing bills have already been introduced in the Legislature in the interests of Republican newspapers, bills to enable them to keep their heads above water two years, and then at the next election they will be assisted to maintain their grip by the gold trust of other States.

The newspapers that espoused the silver cause two years ago made the silver party. It might be a good plan for the Silver Legislature with a majority in both houses to see that the party press was protected from such party legislation.
