

TIME CHANGES, ETC.

When Mr. Beck lived in Franktown in 1871, he realized the many inconveniences of long muddy journeys to the county seat at Reno and accordingly introduced a bill throwing Franktown and the Southern part of Washoe into Ormsby. He introduced a bill—Assembly Bill 226—in the Legislature of 1871, and passed it in the House.

Now that he lives in Reno he opposes the same measure. In other words he wants to subject the people of the southern end of the county to the same inconveniences now that he was not willing to submit to in 1871. While we admire Brother Beck very much as an entertaining speaker on the floor of the house and a general all round legislator, we are forced to confess that we never expect to see him burned at the stake for his consistency. His position shows how time can change a man's ideas on the subject of personal convenience.

The County Division Bill.

The entire afternoon was taken up yesterday in a debate over the County Division Bill. Beck led the opposition to the bill and Noel the forces presenting it. The first test vote showed 18 in favor of the bill and then the trouble began. Beck, Allen, Francis and McNaughton kept up the parliamentary tactics that kept the vote back on the final passage of the bill. Noel moved the previous question and there was a motion to adjourn and a roll call on the motion. As fast as the friends of the bill were about to get the question in, the opposition moved to adjourn and got a roll call. There were also several calls of the House and the opposition was charged with going out in order to delay the passage of the bill. There were some hot passages between Beck and Noel, and at 5:30 it was agreed to have the bill printed and made a special order for 2 o'clock, Monday.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Dr. Hogan rose to a question of privilege yesterday and said that he had been incorrectly quoted by the APPEAL in the statement that he voted for the county division bill in 1871.

He then admitted that he voted for it, but did so in order to reconsider. The APPEAL gives him the full benefit of his denial, but suggests that his statement, that our statement was false, is not corroborated by the record. The roll call shows that he voted for the bill, as for his reasons for so doing we made no enquiry. If Mr. Hogan wants extra copies of the APPEAL of this morning to circulate among his Washoe constituents that he may be set right on the question in the county where he lives, he can have them on application.
