NEVADA LEGISLATURE.

A Record of the Proceedings of the Seventeenth Session.

FORTIETH DAY.

Senate met at 11 A. M. Gov. Sadler presiding. Prayer by Rev. Nash.

Patchen of the Judiciary committee reported unfavorably on S B 25—Relief of Joseph Williams of N. Y. City—Maute of the same committee rendered favorable minority report.

Caucus of Ways and Means Committee reported favorably on the bill to pay the deficiencies in the appropriations of the State Agricultural Society. Referred to Committee of the Whole.

S B 10, Boyle; amending State Constitution. Withdrawn.

S B 32; Summerfield; Deficiency bill. Referred to committee of the Whole.

S B 36 To refund subscriptions to the Midwinter Fair. Passed.

S B 55; amending the act providing for the government of the Orphans Home. Ways and Means.

S B 56; Formation of Corporations for certain purposes. Judiciary.

Convened at 11 A. M. Speaker Allen in the chair.

Roll call, all present.

Journal read and approved.

Noel moved to amend title of A B 81. out of order. Carried.

Noel moved to amend the title so as to read "An act to fix and readjust the boundary lines of Washoe, Storey and Ormsby counties. Amendment adopted. On motion the bill was made a special order for tomorrow at 2 P. M.

A B 119 by Denton—An act to provide for acceptance of land from U S Government. Referred to Committee Internal Improvements.

A B by Denton—An act to provide for the storage of water. Internal Improvements Committee.

A B 121 by Denton—Act to reduce length of session of Legislature. Bill provides that session shall continue till Legislative work is finished. Repeals 50 day law of last session. Referred to Ways and Means Committee.

A B 135 McDonald—Relative to compensation of officers of White Pine county. Judiciary Committee

S B 37—Relative to preservation of fish. Com. Whole.

S B 19—Relative to preventing women visiting saloons. Indefinitely postponed.

S B 40—Relative to manner of drawing juries. Judiciary.

S B 48—Relative to submitting certain questions to voters of Washoe. Washoe delegation.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

House went into Committee of the Whole to consider S. B. 39, an Act relative to preservation of fish. This Bill allows persons to catch fish any time of the year for table use.

Motion by Beck that a committee of one to wait upon Senator Summerfield to address the House on this bill. Beck appointed.

The bill was indefinitely postponed after being reported.

A B 3 (Noel)—Relative to settlement of estates of deceased persons.

Special order for 2 o'clock. The fish bill, Senate Bill 39 was under consideration. Mills the Fish Commissioner was invited to speak and Summerfield who also spoke on it. Mills against Summerfield for the bill. The bill allows fish to be caught at all seasons of the year with hook and line. There was a long and animated discussion, after which the committee of the whole reported unfavorably and the

bill was indefinitely postponed. Special order A B No. 3. An act to regulate the deceased persons. There was a call of the House. Denton spoke several times in favor of the bill and said that under the present laws the widows and orphans of Nevada had been ruthlessly robbed by the thieving administrators of estates. No matter how much a dead man left, the estate was always brought out in debt and the vampires who had charge of the business ate up every cent.

The bill was objected to on account of its length. A motion was made by Flannigan of Washoe to indefinitely postpone. Mr. Noel made an able speech for the bill and stated that for thirty days the bill had been carefully considered by the committee. Mr. Flannigan said he had not read the bill, but that several lawyers had spoken to him in opposition to the bill.

Denton remarked "If the lawyers are opposed to it, that is a good reason why it should pass." Motion to indefinitely postpone, lost. Bill placed on third reading and final passage.

After a partial reading the bill was sent back to the Committee for correction and made a special order for Tuesday.

Weiland's Sheep Bill.

Assemblyman Weiland's bill provides for a license upon the business of owning, raising, grazing, herding or pasturing sheep in the several counties of this State.

The bill provides for seven classes of licenses graded according to the number of sheep owned, controlled or managed by every person engaged in the sheep business.

Those owning 5000 sheep or over constitute the first class and must pay a license of \$250 per annum for the first 5000, and \$50 per annum for every additional 1000 or fraction thereof. The licenses are regularly graduated at the rate of five cents per head down to to the seventh class which includes only those having 1000 sheep or less and on which the tax is \$25 per year. The license to be paid in every county where the sheep are grazed. Failure to procure a license is made a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than fifty nor more than two hundred and fifty dollars, or imprisonment in the county jail for not less than 25 nor more than 90 days.

A Horrible Disaster.

City of Mexico, Feb. 28.—An excursion train coming into the city on the Inter-oceanic railroad met with an accident this afternoon. While rounding a curve on the side of a mountain five coaches jumped the track and went down the canyon. Forty-two people were killed and thirty or more seriously injured. The accident occurred about 40kilometres from this city. The wires have been down and it has been impossible to obtain any details of the awful disaster.
