A new forage plant has been discovered on an island in the Pacific, off the Siberian coast. It is vouchered for a plant that will grow in either wet or dry land, vouchered by high authority, but the marvelous part is that it produces from 90 to 200 tons per acre per annum. It grows to a height of about fourteen feet, but is cut when about four feet high. The pictures of in the native country show the cat-browsing among the plants, the ants extending over their heads even, eight or ten feet. Those most interested believe that it will grow on the arid lands in this part of the country. If that should prove to be true, there would be no more American desert, except here and there a little patch of alkali. We believe the Agricultural Department sells the plants at the rate of \$8 per hundred, they have to be set out four feet apart. With a crop that would amount to 200 tons per acre it seems though the only trouble would be to get ten acres of good land from which to raise the crop and then get out twenty acres of bad land to back it on after it was cut.

On Friday next there will be a bank shoe sale opposite the Post Office, will last two weeks, and the dealer proposes to sell 2000 shoes in that period. Now is the time to buy shoes.

**NEVADA LEGISLATURE.**

**A Record of the Proceedings of the Seventeenth Session.**

**FORTY-FOURTH DAY.**

Senate met at 11 A. M. Gov. Sadler presiding. Prayer by Rev. Nash. McCone granted leave of absence for one day.

Judiciary Committee reported favorably on Assembly Bill 52 and Senate Bill 54.

Agricultural Committee reported favorably on Senate Bill 63.

Assembly Bill 69, relative to White Pine county fund. Judiciary.

Assembly Bill 5. Act to authorize the issuing of Washoe County School bonds. Washoe delegation.

Substitute for Assembly Bill 81. Act to readjust the lines between Washoe, Ormsby and Storey counties.

Mills moved to refer bill to Storey, Ormsby and Washoe counties.

Summerfield moved to amend by reference to Agricultural Committee, County & County Boundaries and Roads and Bridges. Roll called on amendment. Amendment passed.

Ayes, Kaiser, Martin, Maute, Patchen, Richards, Skaggs, Summerfield and Wilson 8. Nays, Boyle, Comins, Gignoux, Gregovich and Mills. 5.

Absent Wise and McCone.

Assembly Bill 118. Revenue act. Ways & Means.

Skaggs moved to reconsider the vote by which Senate Bill 42 was passed. Lost.

Maute moved to reconsider the vote by which Assembly Bill 67 was passed. Carried.

Ways & Means Committee reported unfavorably on Senate Bill 35 and favorably on Senate Bill 61.

**THIRD READING.**

Senate Bill 52. Act to change the name of the Insane Asylum. Passed.

Senate Bill 54. To regulate proceedings in criminal cases. Passed.

The reconsideration of Assembly Bill No. 4. The use of a stamp in the voting booths in voting the Australian ballot, instead of using a lead pencil. Gignoux said that he had received new light on the bill and should vote to reconsider it.

Maute spoke at length showing that there would be less mistakes. Summerfield held that more contests occurred where a stamp was used, and that in California there was a lot of contests which arose from the use of the stamp.

Maute denied this and showed that bosses compelled voters to make their crosses a certain way to show how they had voted.

Skaggs argued against the stamp on the grounds that it was a California invention and that's the reason he was down on it. The bill was lost by a vote of 7 to 6. McCone was absent.

Recess until 2 o'clock.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**

Assembly Bill 79. An act to provide for the electing of county commissioners. Electing them by votes of the entire county instead of by Districts. Passed.

Gignoux gave notice that he would move to reconsider the vote by which the bill passed.

Gignoux introduced Senate Bill 67. An act to provide for the construction of an annex to the Nevada Asylum. Insane Asylum Commissioners.

Boyle, Senate Bill 68. An act to consolidate Storey and Ormsby, and Douglas and Lyon. Referred to the county delegation.

Dr. Bergstein addressed the Senate on the bill providing for an annex to the Insane Asylum, showing that the Asylum was so crowded that its efficiency was seriously impaired. Committee arose and reported favorably on the bill.

Senate Bill 63. Act relative to highways. Passed.

Assembly Bill 109. Regulating proceedings in criminal cases. Lost 3 to 10.

Senate Bill 67. Asylum annex. Bill considered engrossed and placed at bottom of file.

Assembly Bill 67. Paying taxes in semi-annual installments.

Comins said the bill was in the interest of the large land holders and heavy tax payers, who were tax shirkers and if the bill was passed the people of the State would regret it.

Gignoux held that it was in the interest of the small tax payers. In his section the ranchers had to pay their hands in the Fall, and their Fall taxes at the same time and it was great hardship. Some had to borrow money at outrageous rates, and some had to sell property to meet the tax collector. The bill would allow the taxpayer to pay one-half in December and the rest in June. Martin spoke in the interest of the farmers who want the bill to pass.

Senate Bill 60. Appropriation bill taken up and considered in Committee of the Whole.

**ASSEMBLY**

Convened at 10 A. M. Speaker on the chair.

Roll call. Stantes and Hagan granted leave of absence for the day.

Prayer by Chaplain Merrill.

Journal read and approved.

**PETITIONS**

Pitt filed two relative to S B 16.

**MOTIONS**

Beck asked leave to withdraw petition filed by himself relating to Sub for A B 81. Granted.

Crisler asked leave to withdraw petition relating to A B 81. Granted.

Motion that A B 121 be taken up and referred to Com. of the Whole. Carried.

On motion House resolved into Com. of the Whole to consider A B 121 and matters relating thereto.

A B 121 (Denton)—An Act to reduce time and limit duration of sessions of Legislature and repeal certain acts relating to same.

Motion that when Committee do arise it report progress and desire further time.

A C 125 (Allen, C E)—An Act licensing sale of cigarettes and cigarette paper. [This bill reduces license for sale of same to \$15 per quarter. Any person selling same to persons under 21 years of age shall be fined not less than \$100 or more than \$500.]

Conboie offered amendment by making fine not less than \$100. Out of order.

Motion that when Committee arise it report progress on bill and desire further time. Recess.

**AFTERNOON SESSION.**

Special order postponed until 2 o'clock Thursday.

**INTRODUCTION AND FIRST READING.**

A B 130 (Russell)—An Act to provide for the preservation of fish in the waters of this State. Referred to Internal Improvement Committee.

Motion that the House resolve itself into a Committee to consider matters referred thereto. Carried.

Substitute for A B 121 (Denton)—An Act reducing the length of the sessions of the Nevada Legislature, and matters relating to the Legislature.

Motion that when the Committee do arise it report the substitute to the House.

A B 57 (Conboie)—An Act to issue commissions to cadets graduating from the State University.

Motion that when the Committee do arise it strike out section 4.

**AFTER RECESS.**

A. B. 119. Introduced by Joint Committee on Irrigation, providing for the reclamation of State lands under the Cleary act and the appointment of a State Engineer to hold five years. On motion of Allen of Churchill the term of office was limited to two years. McDonald, Denton and Allen of Eureka spoke in favor of the bill and Russell and Newman against it. Allen of Eureka moved an amendment that the land sold under the act be not less than \$5 an acre, adopted, and it was finally agreed to report the bill back recommending its passage as amended.

A. B. 120 Act to define existing water rights and regulate water storage. The bill was discussed at great length in the Committee of the Whole. Committee reported progress on the bill and leave to sit again.

A. B. 125. Act relating to sale of cigarettes. Provided five days in jail for boys smoking cigarettes. Several members opposed the bill on the grounds that they did not want to see the jails filled with boys. After some amendments the bill was finally reported.

A. B. 131. Act relative to the State tax levy; ordered engrossed. Adjourned.
