**DEPEW ON THE SITUATION.**

Chauncey M. Depew, the great railroad magnet, who is supposed to have the Presidential bee in his bonnet, has been interviewed on the political situation. He says he is ready to support Reed, McKinley or any other good Republican. He is not particular as to the man or his principles providing he is a good Republican. Regarding the financial question he says:

The Currency issue will cut a larger figure in the platforms than in the actual results of the campaign. Eastern people are mainly wage-earners; Western people are producers. The Easterners believe that free silver coinage will give him only half pay for his labor, while his wages will buy only half as much as before. The Westerner as much for his wheat or corn, and yet expects to buy things on the same ratio as at present.

The political bosses are now devoting their attention to the Eastern workman. If they can make him believe that he is being robbed of half his wages, when he is paid in standard dollars, they will secure his aid in the campaign and his vote on election day. He is not supposed to know that a standard dollar is a legal tender for all debts and that it will buy as much of the products of the West as a gold dollar. If he can be taught to be as selfish as the goldbug he will not care for the producers of the West or what they receive for their products. Mr. Depew will not take the pains to tell him, and the subsidized papers which he reads will not inform him, that if the Western producer cannot get more than the cost of production for his wheat or corn he will have no money to purchase what the Eastern workman manufactures. He is, if possible, to be kept in ignorance of the fact that if the former receives only half a dollar a day for his labor Eastern factories cannot find a market for their products in the West.

**TWO COMBINES.**

One of the conspirators in the infamous legislative combine in California has squealed. It appears that the California Senate nursed a cinch bill combine to bleed or blackmail wealth and the members divided equally the proceeds of their plundering operations.

It was a regular highwayman's association and everybody with a surplus of cash had to stand and deliver. This was the California Legislative combine. There was also one in the Senate of the recent Nevada Legislature. Eight members banded together and agreed that they would cut down State expenses and vote against all bills containing unnecessary appropriations.

This is the difference probably between the "Golden State" of California and the "Rotten Burrough" of Nevada.
