

THE ORPHANS' HOME.

The gold press of Nevada is endeavoring to make it appear that changing the Superintendent of the Orphans' Home is one of the greatest outrages that ever perpetrated. The Enterprise, whose editor is said to have been recently imported to teach the people of Nevada that the way to remonetize silver is to support parties that are committed to the gold standard, and the editor of the Carson Tribune, who has not been in the State a year, are very much exercised over the change at the Home, though it is probable that neither of them ever visited the place or expended a nickel in purchasing candy for its inmates. They do not seem to know that changes have been made at the Home, almost every time there has been a change of administration, since it was founded. The fact that children are being constantly sent to the Home and are taken from the Home whenever other homes can be found for them, never enters their minds, nor does it occur to them that the new Superintendent may be as kind to the children as any foster-father that has ever been at the Home. They attempt to create a prejudice against the new Superintendent, who is a man whose character is above reproach, before he is given a trial, and failing in that will take no further interest in the Home or its inmates.—Reno

THE RISE IN SILVER.

The price in silver is advancing. Bullion is now seven or eight cents an ounce higher than it was a few weeks ago. Various causes are assigned for the advance, but whatever the cause the effect is encouraging. Mining stocks as well as other securities on the San Francisco Boards show signs of activity and improvement because of the advance in silver. Should the price continue to improve until silver reaches a dollar and a quarter an ounce the effect in Nevada would be marvelous. Mines and mills now idle would in a short time be in active operation and a general business revival would be inaugurated in a few months.

San Francisco Meat Market.

Beef is going up with silver in San Francisco, and if silver continues to advance wheat, wool and other products will follow it. Since Eastern buyers have been purchasing fat cattle in Nevada the price has advanced about two cents per pound. This has affected the San Francisco market, and beef is higher than for some time past. The San Francisco market however, is said to be overstocked with mutton, and buyers are taking charge of the rush to depress the market. The rush of mutton sheep to San Francisco is said by the city papers to have been caused by the demand on sheep men for money advanced.

The advance in the price of silver yesterday was extremely gratifying; it means without doubt that financial men look for a heavy demand for the white metal, probably in connection with the expected war indemnity from China to Japan; and perhaps also somewhat in the view of the strong silver talk in Germany and the coming monetary conference. Whatever makes it though, it is welcome, and the higher the rise the more welcome it will be.—Salt Lake Tribune.
